## London versus Galt

The Alerts Will Play Their Strongest Nine Tomorrow.

Plummer Will Pitch—Cooper Defeats Toronto Wins Again.

## THE WHEEL

**RACES AT ROCHESTER.**  
Rochester, N. Y., June 12.—Tom Cooper beat E. C. Bald at the race meet of the Rochester A. C. twice. The first time was in the quarter-mile open. Both Cooper and Wm. Randall, of the city, finished ahead of Bald. He had the advantage of Cooper at one part of the race, but both Randall and Cooper passed him. In the mile open, which was paced, Cooper caught the pacing machine, while L. A. Callahan and Bald were fighting for it. Callahan hooked on to Cooper, with Bald next, and Conn Baker following. At the three-quarters, Bald began to spurt. Cooper tacked on his rear wheel, and followed him through the bunch. When they had pulled clear of the crowd, Cooper rode around Bald on the outside, and left him by a couple of lengths, winning easily. There were some accidents, the most serious of which was one which occurred to Arthur S. Lee, of the N. Y. A. C. He was spilled in the mile open amateur, landing on his head and going into convulsions. He was taken to a hospital in an ambulance. Late last night he was reported as doing well, with no internal injuries. The times of the short races were very fast, owing to a strong wind blowing down the home stretch. As the track is a mile oval, the quarter-mile races were almost straightaway, and this, together with the wind, made the finishes fast. None of them were slower than 30 seconds. Harley Davidson rode an exhibition quarter in 26 3/4 seconds. Kuschland Bauer, of the Lakeview Wheelmen, Rochester, rode an exhibition quarter on a tandem in 26 5/8 seconds, and Jackson and Hume

## WORE A RED TIE.

A 12-Year Old Attacked for Showing His Colors—His Brother Grabbed While Defending Him.

A stabbing affray was enacted opposite the Conservative Club rooms on Dundas street last night.

Edward Hobbertson, who lives with his widowed mother, just south of the track, on Talbot street, was the victim. He had been looking at the parade in company with his 12-year-old brother, George, who wore a red tie—the Hyman color. The youngster was jeered at by a set of young hoodlums, and a scrimmage ensued. Edward, seeing his little brother set upon by three or four boys, went to the rescue, and pulled them off. A lad, whose name is known, had some words with the elder Hobbertson, who pushed him off the sidewalk for calling him a foul name. The stranger went away for a few minutes, and when they met again, rushed at Hobbertson with an open knife. Hobbertson put up his hands, and received an ugly slash in the left one. The wound was dressed by Dr. John Fraser and the boy sent home.

## PENALTY OF DEFEAT.

The Beaten Italian General May be Imprisoned Ten Years.

Massowah, June 12.—The Advocate-General, in closing his address for the prosecution today at the trial by court martial of Gen. Baratieri, the Italian commander, who was defeated by the Abyssinians at Adowa on the 1st of March, with the loss of about 12,500 men killed and wounded, demanded that the general be sentenced to ten years' confinement in fortress, with the attendant penalties.

## BARNATO'S KINDNESS.

Offered to Pay \$250,000 in Fines for His Friends.

London, June 12.—A special dispatch from Pretoria says that as soon as the decision of the executive council to release John Edgar Hammond, George Farrar, Col. Rhodes and J. W. Leonard, the Johannesburg reform committee leaders, upon the payment of fines amounting to \$125,000, was announced, Barney Barnato, the so-called "Kaiser King," went to the jail with a check for \$250,000, with which to pay the fines of Messrs. Rhodes and Leonard. He found, however, that the matter had already been arranged. Hammond, Farrar and Phillips have signed an agreement to abstain from any further interference in the politics of the South African Republic. Consequently the sentence of banishment upon them is now a dead letter, so long as they keep their word.

## SHOT HIS WIFE.

A Toronto Man's Cruel Deed—The Woman May Die.

(Special to the "Advertiser.")

Toronto, June 12.—In a two-story rough-cast house at 276 Victoria street a row, which will probably end in the murder of a woman, occurred this morning.

James Hewatt, a teamster for McFarlane & Co., the coal and wood dealers, fired two shots at his wife with a revolver. One went through the bleep of the left arm, while the other, thought to be lodged in the spinal column, the doctors say yet have been unable to locate the bullet in the latter wound, but if it has gone any further it will surely cause death. As soon as he did the shooting Hewatt fled from the house and made his escape. No motive for the crime has yet been found.

## Ingram's Eye Blacked.

The Ex-M. P. in a Fight With a Woodstock Hotel Man.

## A Former C. P. R. Conductor—The Talk of the Streets—An Eye-Witness Account.

One of the leading hotels of the city last night was the scene of a fight in which A. B. Ingram, ex-M.P. for East Elgin, got "two lovely black eyes," and today the affair is the talk of the streets.

The row took place between 12 and 1 o'clock, and created intense excitement among the spectators while it lasted. The other party in the affair was Mr. Frank McLean, a Woodstock hotel-keeper, and who was formerly a conductor on the C.P.R. The fracas arose over a discussion of the present political situation.

Eye-witnesses state that the ex-conductor proved the better man, and quickly sent his opponent to grass. Then, it is said, Mr. McLean was caught from behind by the friends of the ex-M.P., and would no doubt have been badly injured but for the timely interference of an elderly gentleman who tossed the little ex-M.P. into a corner, and rescued the hotel man from his cowardly assailant.

Mr. McLean was formerly one of the strongest Conservative workers in this city, but it is understood that he now has little use for the aggregation.

## THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY

Two Professors for Knox College Wanted—The Manitoba College.

Toronto, June 12.—The Presbyterian General Assembly, at its session this morning, received the reports from the various colleges. On motion of Principal King, who reported for Manitoba College, the question of discontinuing summer sessions was referred to a committee, on the understanding that summer sessions should be discontinued.

Prof. Caven, of Knox College, asked on behalf of that college that two additional members to the staff be appointed, the salaries of these appointments to be \$2,500 each. The report was adopted.

## CONCLUDING SESSIONS OF THE CHAMBERS OF COMMERCE.

Canadian Currency System Adopted—Postal and Telegraph Routes Through British Territory.

London, June 12.—The congress of the Chambers of Commerce of the British Empire assembled this morning at 10 o'clock for its fourth and final sitting, under the presidency of Sir Albert Kaye-Rollit, president of the London Chamber of Commerce. The resolution of the Newcastle and Gateshead Chamber of Commerce, introduced by Sir Charles D. Phipps, that so far as possible it is most important that inter-imperial post and telegraph routes should be established between Great Britain and the colonies, as well as between the colonies themselves, with such routes passing through other countries, was adopted.

The following resolution, introduced by the London Chamber of Commerce, relating to bills of lading, was adopted: "That this congress express strong disapproval of the method adopted in bills of lading of inserting clauses contracting ship owners practically out of all liability and requests the London Chamber of Commerce to provide a conference with ship owners in order to eliminate these clauses, or failing that, to introduce a bill in Parliament defining the liability of ship owners."

Later the motion of the Liverpool Chamber of Commerce, condemning the new fog signals, was passed.

Mr. John W. Williams, for the Leeds Chamber of Commerce, submitted the following motion: "That connection by railway of a seaport in Burma with Southwest China at Sumat is greatly required in order to open out to the trade of the Empire our new territories in the basin of the Mekong, to enable manufacturers of the Empire to compete with those of France in Northern Siam and in Southwest China." It was adopted.

The emigration resolution of the Winnipeg Board of Trade, moved by Mr. Frank L. Patten, was next brought up and adopted.

A similar resolution moved by Mr. H. B. Joyner, representing the Qu'Appelle Board of Trade, was adopted later.

On motion of Mr. J. K. Perrault, for the Montreal Chamber of Commerce, the following resolutions were adopted: "Whereas the British currency system of pounds, shillings, pence and farthings is a source of constant annoyance and loss of time to the trade, especially to the foreign trade who have adopted a decimal system; and whereas the system of dollars and cents now covers the whole of the North American continent, with a population of 70,000,000 English-speaking people, be it resolved, that the Canadian decimal system of currency, which answers all purposes, be extended to the other portions of the British empire, the pound sterling to be equal to 100 and the shillings to 25 cents."

"Where the British system of weights and measures, which vary constantly in every part of the British empire, is a source of constant annoyance and loss of time and a formidable obstacle to local, imperial and foreign trade; and whereas the metric system has been now universally recognized as the most perfect decimal system, and generally adopted by nations of both continents with the exception of the British Empire and United States of America, be it resolved that the metric system of weights and measures be adopted throughout further delay by the several Governments of the empire, the yard being extended to the meter, the quart to the liter, and the two pounds weight to the kilogramme."

After a resolution expressing the congress to be in favor of closer connection between the Government and the Chamber of Commerce had been adopted, the congress adjourned.
