

### JUDGMENT FOR THE DEFENDANT

In the Milligan vs. Macdonald Case-An Important Decision in Favor of a London Lady.

Chancellor Boyd on Saturday delivered an important judgment as to the respective rights of the creditors and a widow to the life insurance of a debtor even in cases where the latter expresses a desire that his debts shall be plaid from the policies. The case was that of Milligan vs. Macdonald, and was tried at St. Thomas some time ago to ascertain the right to \$25,000, proceeds of certain insurance policies on the life of Norman Macdonald, barrister, deceased. The plaintiffs are creditors, and defendant is the widow (now a resident of London), of deceased. Held, that the policies being effected under the Ontario insurance act, the proceeds must go to the widow as beneficiary, under section 159, the parol declarations of deceased not being sufficient to change the statutory trust, nor can the letter written by him and received by his wife after his death be enforced by the court. All the money is the property of the widow, but having regard to the expressed will of the deceased that the creditors shall be paid, there will be no costs. Judgment for defendant.
