# CONFESSES MURDER SHE MARRIED

Young Walter McAllister May Be Expelled By the Masons:

New York Nov. 23.-In response to a request made by Walter McAllister, one of the four men confined in the Paterson (N. J.) jail accused of the murder of Jennie Bosschieter, the Rev. Dr. David Magie, pastor of the Church of the Redecemer, visited the jail on Wednesday and had a long conversation with the prisoner

It was reported that McAllister had made a confession to the clergyman. When seen Dr. Magie refused to say anything on the subject. What was said to him, he declared, was in the strictest confidence.

Rumors regarding the influence it was alleged that would be brought to bear to save McAllister are considered responsible for the action taken by Adoniram Lodge of Perfection of the Masonic Order of Paterson, in bringing charges of immorality and conduct unbecoming a Mason against him. There are two specifications. The first relates to Jennie Bosschieter and the other to the Lizzie Schaub case. # ECHOES OF THE STORM

Many Mishaps Caused by the Recent Gale.

Additions to the Death List in Tennessee - A Hundred Homes Wrecked in One Locality.

Nashville, Tenn., Nov. 23. — Latest reports from the districts swept by Tuesday's storm show that seven persons lost their lives in Williamson county. One more death, that of Clayton Tucker, has occurred near Columbia, making the total in that section 24. Three persons injured at Nollensville are in a critical condition. Notensville are in a critical condition.

Three members of the Ellis family at
Walnut Lake, Tunica county, Miss.,
were killed. Clarence Thomas, living near Corinth Miss., was carried away by the wind, and no trace of him has been found. In Arkansas, six dead and twenty-five injured have been reported. The victims are principally negroes. Much suffering is reported The streams are swollen, and altogether the storm section presents scene of terrible devastation.

A HUNDRED HOUSES WRECKED. Colorado Springs, Col., Nov. 22.-Daylight revealed a tangled mass of wreck-age in the streets of this city. The gale which sprang up yesterday afternoon relaiched a velocity of 85 miles an hour. At midnight it had subsided to 50 miles, but dozens of roofs lay in the streets, hundreds of telegraph and telephone poles were prostrated, while thousands of wires were hopelessly tangled. Edgar T. Ensign was caught under a falling pole, and sustained injuries which will probably result in his death. It is estimated that one hundred frame dwellings were demolished in the outlying portions of the city.

TWO CHURCHES WRECKED. Oswego, N. Y., Nov. 23.-Trinity Methodist Church here was entirely de-stroyed yesterday by fire caused by defective electric hight wiring. Loss on building, organ and furnishings, \$40,000; unsurance of \$15,000. Kingston, N. Y., Nov. 23 .- The Re-

formed Church at Marbletown here was destroyed by a tornado. The roof was blown several hundred feet into the woods and the steeple and the bell were carried across the street. A Watertown, N. Y., dispatch says:
