SETTLED AT LAST. Another phase of the long-drawn-out case of Pring vs. Pascoe was taken up before the Methodist Church court of appeal at Toronto, Friday, and the case was dismissed. This is a somewhat complicated issue. Mrs. A. W. Pring some time ago charged Rev. Mr. Pascoe, of Ridgeway, with partiality and maladministration, but Rev. Stephen Bond, senior chairman of the London conference, ruled that the conference had no jurisdiction to hear the case. Succeeding presidents of the conference, Rev. W. Rigby, and the late Rev. Joseph Edge, of this city, also refused to rule in the case, and Rev. Dr. Ross brought action against Mr. Edge to make a test case. The issue was tried before Rev. Dr. Hanson, of Chatham, in the Central Methodist Church, Stratford, and Dr. Hanson decided that Mr. Edge was justified in not ruling the case. The action was, therefore, brought before the court of appeal, and is now dismissed.

Toronto, April 17, 8 p.m.—Showers have occurred in the Georgian Bay region today and in the western portion of the lower lake region; elsewhere in Canada the weather has been fine. The depression, which was in the Missouri valley last night, now covers the Georgian Bay, and another disturbance of importance is situated in Tennessee.

## DIED IN FAR-AWAY AFRICA

Cable Announces Demise of Joseph H. Aiken in Natal—Was Well Known in London.

A cable message was received here yesterday afternoon announcing the death of Mr. Joseph H. Aiken, at Greytown, Natal, of typhoid fever. He was a son of Mrs. Wm. Aiken, of Downie, Perth county, and was educated at the public schools and collegiate institute of St. Marys. In 1884 he went to South Africa in the interests of J. W. Lyon, of Guelph, and returned to Canada again in 1888, when he married a daughter of the late Rev. James Ferguson, of this city. Since that time he has been engaged in business in South Africa, with offices in Cape Town, Johannesburg and Durban, and had made two or twelve trips between Canada and Cape Town. His wife and four children, now resident in South London, expected to rejoin him this summer.

Mr. Aiken was well known to Advertiser readers. Some five years ago he gave a series of illustrated lectures upon South African subjects, and while home over a year ago, an exceedingly interesting interest with him regarding the war was published. Though only 49 years of age, he had built up a successful business, the firm, Aiken, Humphris & Co., being large importers of American and English goods. The utmost sympathy is felt for his bereaved family, who had no knowledge of the serious nature of his illness until informed of his death.

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## The Milkmen's Appeal.

The dairymen in this vicinity have issued the following circular: To the Citizens of London:

A number of capitalists are trying to control the milk supply of this city. They intend putting on the market a "pasteurized milk," and no doubt will claim it is better than that which we are supplying to you. We intend remaining in the field, and in defense of our position quote the following from Dr. L. Emmett Holt, the best authority on healthy milk in New York City:

"Heating milk for purposes of sterilization is a present imperative in cities during the warm months, as ordinary milk is from twelve to thirty-six hours old when received, and from twenty-four to seventy-two hours old when it is consumed. In the country it is a safeguard to be used when doubt exists in regard to the health of the cows or the handling of the milk; but when clean milk can be obtained fresh every morning from healthy cows it is unnecessary. Sterilized milk requires the same modification for infant feeding as plain milk. While I advise and constantly use milk which has been heated, my preference is strongly for that which is sufficiently pure, clean and fresh to render this unnecessary. I believe the direction in which we are to work is toward saving the greatest attention to the cows, the feeding of cows, and to the handling of the milk in order to prevent every possible contamination." The above is the opinion of one of the most careful men in the medical profession, who has charge of several hospitals for children in New York City.
