London, Wednesday, August 6. American Fishermen Alarmed.

Gloucester (Mass.) Times sees lisaster to the New England fisheries union of Newfoundland with Canada. Gloucester is the center of the American fishery interests on the North Atlantic coast, and the Times is a recognized authority on fishery matters. The result of the union, the Times argues, would be to transfer the undivided control of the North Atlantic fisheries to Ottawa, and the Gloucester and Boston fleets would goon find themselves deprived of the right to enter Newfoundland and Nova Scotia waters to purchase bait. The

Times goes on to say:

"As an example of the value of New-Coundland's bait supply, not alone to the United States, but also to the Canadian vessels fishing on the Grand Banks, it is only necessary to point out that while 66 Gloucester schooners procured licenses in Newfoundland waters last season to buy bait, no less than 99 Canadian vessels did the same, so it will readily be seen what en immense boon it will be to the Dominion to obtain control—absolute and direct-of this important lever in controlling the deep sea fisheries of the North Atlantic. It is impossible to suppose, then, in view of the well-known attitude of the Ottawa Cabinet on this bait fishery question, that Canada will refrain from 'put-ting the screws on,' if she can absorb in one week would mean a considerthis colony. That will mean that the New Eng and fishermen must prepare themselves to face a completely altered fishery situation. If they are forbided fishery situation. If they are forbidden access to the bait supplies, their industry must be crippled. If they concede reciprocity to Canada in fish products, the stocks of fish which will be sent from the Maritime Provinces (then including Newfoundland) will be so great as to compel a lowering of the price of the American caught article and a correspondcan-caught article, and a corresponding decline in the profits of the American interests involved. Canada is seeking new markets for her fish; the United States is doing the same; the power which holds possession of bait supply, which alone makes the industry possible, will be able to dictate its own terms to the other. Nor is this the worst phase of the subject. The winter herring fishery, now almost exclusively controlled by the Americans who go to Newfoundland every winter and carry away about \$250,000 worth of this fish, would then be closed to them also. The Canadians clones within a year. If this is to coneither by absolutely forbidding the Americans to engage in it or by imposing an export tax on herring shipped in foreign bottoms, which would assuredly compel the Americans to abandon the industry. The herring fishery is almost indispensable to the Atlantic States, because the herring are the main source of bait for the early fisheries on the southern banks, and also are in general demand as an edible as far west as Chicago. The present American tariff, which imposes a duty of Into United States ports in foreign bottoms, makes it impossible for the Newfoundland or Canadian fishermen o engage in this industry under existing conditions, but should Newfoundand enter the Dominion, it would then be possible to turn the tables on the Americans and control the fishery from

It is quite true that if the full control of the deepjea fisheries passed to Ottawa, as it would in the event of union, the Amrican fishermen would be able to conlinue their present scale of operations on the sufferance of the Canadian Sovernment. The latter could take Ldvantage of this dependence on the Danadian bait supply to compel the United States to place fish on the free list or grant some reciprocal favor in the American market. This the Washington Government has always refused to do, because it could make terms with Newfoundland without consulting Dominion. There is some excuse. therefore, for the apprehension of the Cloucester Times that the absorption of Newfoundland would be a good thing for the Canadian fisheries. The Mosquito.

would reduce the price of fish.

There has been a plague and eruption of mosquitoes this season, due to the prolonged spell of wet weather. Londoners may find comfort in the act that the pest is everywhere the same. The Jersey mosquito, supposed to be the worst of the tribe, has been the subject of scientific investigation by the state entomologist of New Jerjey and he has thrown a great deal of light on its habits. He finds that the thousands of little pools, ponds. and ditches in the marshes, which the lides do not leave empty and which hold more or less stagnant water the year round, are the breeding places. He has found them so crowded with mosquito larvae that a pool 10x15 feet would produce 1,000,000 mosquitoes at one hatching. As there are thousands of these pools in the Jersey as well as in all other marshes, it is impossible to conceive of the number of mosquitoes produced in a single summer The remedy is to fill up the marsh depressions and shake petroleum over the pools so as to prevent the larvae this refers only to marsh districts whereas mosquitoes are as numerous

The course at the schools presents it in an attractive form and tends to cultivate an interest in practical household duties which are not as popular in the present day as they might be. Perhaps the prevailing scarcity of domestic help is not without its uses if it compels a closer attention to kitchen details by "the lady of the house." Whether she can afford help or not, the art of management is equally necessary and she who possesses it is more precious than rubies. A scientific training in domestic economy will make a girl more
