Just a faint idea of the anxiety to procure hands was evinced at the Union station recently, when on the arrival of the Montreal trains at a.m., bearing 100 immigrants, no fewer than 200 farmers or their deputies were crowding the doors of the immi-gration offices and participating in one of the liveliest times they ever experienced in engaging farm laborers.
