TWO PASSENGER TRAINS MEET IN A DEATH-DEALING CRASH

Awful Disaster on Southern Pacific Railway.

DEATH LIST MAY REACH TWENTY

Eight of the Dead Have Been Identified—Large Number of Persons Injured.

Tucson, Ariz., Jan. 28.—Two Southern Pacific passenger trains collided head-on today, when running at full speed, near Vails, fifteen miles east of Tucson. Eleven cars were consumed in a few minutes. Engineer Bruce and his fireman and Engineer Willis were burned to death, and the latter's fireman seriously injured.

Eight bodies have been found. How many were consumed is not known. A relief train has brought seventeen injured here. J. M. Hilton, of Cambridge, Mass., was burned to death.

The first known of the collision was the coming of the tourist, which broke loose from one of the trains and ran down grade to Tucson, where it was captured.

THE CASUALTIES.

Following is a partial list of the casualties:

The killed—J. M. Hilton, Cambridge, Mass.; J. W. Bruce, engineer; O. R. Wiley, engineer; George M. Grath, fireman.

Seriously injured—Frederick Romero, Juarez, Mexico; H. W. Harrison, Saginaw, Mich.; Fred Donahue, Battle Creek, Mich.; Ben Sawyer, mail clerk, New York; O. S. Gilbert, fireman; B. F. Bradford, Mayville, N. Y. Many others were cut by glass.

Less than eight were killed and the number may run to twenty.

ELEVEN CARS BURNED.

The trains came together with a terrific crash. The engines and cars were piled up in a mass and immediately took fire from the exploding oil tanks of the engines. The flames were communicated to the cars, eleven of which were consumed. Several of the injured were taken to Benson, Ariz.

OPERATOR TO BLAME.

Manager Alger said: "Telegrams we have received say that the collision took place before daylight this morning. The coffee had been open and the negligence of the telegraph operator at Esmond, a station fourteen miles east of Tucson. The westbound train, headed by the Sunset Limited, was two hours late, and was traveling at the time of another train. The eastbound train was the Crescent City express, which left the Oakland Mole at 10

PRAYED ON THE TOWER

Sensation Created by Two Visitors at the Dominion Capital.

Ottawa, Jan. 28.—A couple of devout enthusiasts who registered as D. W. Griffin, Brockville, and J. M. Gay, Harrison, Mich., ascended the main tower of the Parliament Buildings yesterday morning, and from that commanding height poured forth prayers for the regeneration of the wicked world, 180 feet below them. Their stentorian exercises attracted the attention of some officials of the government, and they were taken to the tower, raised the alarm. Caretaker Vincent, of the tower, ran up to the cupola and ushered the strangers down.

A Dozen Men Hurt.

Fort Wayne, Ind., Jan. 28.—An explosion at the Eckart Packing Company's plant this morning buried a dozen men in the ruins, all of whom were injured, some, it is believed fatally. A large part of the plant was destroyed and a fire followed the explosion.

Two bodies have already been taken from the Eckart plant and others are still in the ruins. Four injured taken to the hospital are believed to be fatally hurt.

ENGINE RUNS AMUCK.

Tilsonburg, Ont., Jan. 28.—This morning, as a G. L. E. and P. Railway engine, with two cars loaded with lumber and one box car, was backing down the Tilson siding to the mills, the engine became unmanageable and ran down the grade. Mr. Menzies, who was packing barrels in the car, was seriously injured, as well as two other men, Markle and Rason. The runaway train then went on to the batmeal mill and ran into a couple more cars. The jar caused by the last collision gave the engine a start forward, and one of the crew met the train as it slowly descended the grade. He got the engine under control before further damage was done.

STOCK TRAINS COLLIDE.

Chicago, Jan. 28.—Three Iowa stockmen were killed and six seriously injured and eight slightly injured in a rear-end collision today between stock trains on the Chicago and Northwestern Railway, near La Fox, Ill. The trains came together in a dense fog.

SIX MEN KILLED.

Annisburg, Ala., Jan. 28.—The large boiler in the malleable foundry of the Southern Car and Foundry Company exploded today. Six persons were killed and probably twenty were hurt, several of whom may die.

Dead—Thomas Birch, Ike Hardy, J. A. Forte, John Mitchell, Charles Strong and an unknown coalheaver. The three latter were colored men.

Fatally injured—W. H. Lewis, Clyde Price, Anthony McKinney and C. F. Hall.

DEATH BY DYNAMITE.

Nelson, B. C., Jan. 28.—Edward Willis was killed yesterday while drilling in a mine. He was aged 35 and was from which the charge went off unexpectedly. Deceased was 35 years of age, the principal owner of the Port Armatum mines, and a partner in the well-known jewelry firm of Tiffany & Co., of New York.
