The crew of thirty men are still on the vessel, but in spite of the distress signals not al boat can reach her. The men are on the upper deck, and are safe unless the big craft goes to pieces, when there would be little chance of saving them.

WHERE THE ASHTABULA IS LYING

Port Burwell is on Lake Erie, about 25 miles east of Port Stanley. It is entered by one railway, the C. P. R. This railway was built some ears ago by Mr. John Teale, and ran only to Tillsonburg.

The C. P. R. later took charge of it, and extended it to Ingersoll. The Government has spent many thousands of dollars on the harbor, until today it is one of the finest on Lake Erie.

The Canadian Pacific entered into the coal business, and the Ashtabula, which ran for a very short time out of Port Stanley, was placed on the

For some years she has been one of the most trustworthy vessels of the lakes, and aside from a few minor accidents has never been in any serious distress. She is a sister-ship to the ill-fated Bessemer.

She is 350 feet long, and about the same dimensions as the lost steam-She is in charge of Capt. Higginson, who has sailed the lakes for many

years, and who has the reputation of being one of the most careful as well as one of the best equipped sailors on fresh water. Port Burwell has a population of about 400. The population is made up

largely of fishermen and the families. Some years ago it was a summer resort of some importance, but of late ears few people have gone to the port for a holiday.

The breakwater out of the harbor has produced a sandbar, and the pheomenal lowering of the water following a northeast blow, is the cause of the Ashtabula going on the sandbars.

The vessels is equipped with compartments for water ballasting, and is modern in many of its improvements.

The men are in the upper deck and while not suffering greatly as yet from cold or exposure, they are greatly endangered.

So serious is their situation that the life-saving crew from Port Stanley was hurried to the scene and efforts are being made to land the crew.

35 Men Aboard.

There are 35 men aboard, in charge of Captain Haagenson one of the crown and a splintering of wood, and before any warning cry could be uttered, the rear coach of the train No. 10 had been splintered by the heavy engine hauling the Twentieth Century. North East being but a hamlet and at night cut off except by railway telegraph lines from the outside world, news of the wreck travelled slowly. After midnight a report reached here that two freight trains had run together head on, at North East, with no fatalities. By a roundabout way, the report was found to be erroneous.
