A WINTER PORT ON LOWER ST. LAWRENCE

Montreal, March 22. — Rodolphe Forget, M. P., is of the opinion that the Government of Canada should create a Canadian winter port at St. Lawrence, where there is a fine natural harbor. Engineers have been taking observations respecting winter conditions for some time past. St. Lawrence is close to the entrance to the Saguenay River, on the north shore of the St. Lawrence. The creation of such a port would increase the continuation of the projected north shore railway from Murray River to the Saguenay.

MARQUETTE SWITCHMEN GET AN INCREASE

Chicago, March 22. — Increases of 5 cents an hour to switchmen and \$2 a month to tenderers and lower men affiliated with the Switchmen's Union of North America, was granted by the Federal arbitration board this afternoon. The increase goes into effect Feb. 10, on the Chicago and Eastern Illinois, Chicago, Great Western, Rock Island, Terminal Transfer, Lake Shore, Michigan Central, Port Huron and Wisconsin Central Railroads.

ATE POISONED CAPSULE

Sister of Murdered Girl Says Man Gave Them to Her.

Massillon, O., March 22. — "Not guilty" was the verdict rendered by a jury of 12 men in the case of a woman charged with murdering her sister, Elizabeth, aged 19, by administering a deadly drug.

This morning, after a night in the Massillon jail, the girl underwent a two-hour examination before Chief of Police Erdle and Mayor Remley. She finally gave the police the name of the man who, she said, gave her the poison supposed to have caused the death of her sister. Beyond saying that the man lives in Canton, the police will tell nothing. Massillon authorities went to Canton this afternoon to search for him.

According to the girl's latest version of the affair, she purchased strychnine at the man's request for the purpose of killing a dog. Two days before Elizabeth was found dead, Catherine says, this man gave her two capsules. One of them she threw away, and the other she placed on the kitchen table in the main home.

FIRST JEW IN CABINET

The Macabean Club Gives a Banquet to Mr. Herbert Samuel.

London, March 22. — The Macabean Club of London has just held a banquet in honor of Herbert Samuel, naming him as the first Jew to hold a place in the cabinet. The majority of people would consider a member of the Macabean Club to be a Jew. The Macabean Club apparently only recognizes as a Jew one who holds the Jewish faith, thus relinquishing all rights in the great Jew who was prime minister of England—Herbert Samuel.

It is now recalled that similar referring to that of the Macabeans over Mr. Samuel's promotion occurred when a Rothschild was raised to the peerage. He was hailed as the first Jewish peer. "What about Disraeli?" asked then by the uninitiated, and the same explanation was given. He had abandoned the Jewish faith and was no longer counted as a Jew.

Benjamin Disraeli was about 13 when he left the Jewish church. His father, Isaac Disraeli, was a member of the Spanish synagogue where he worshipped and took his children to the church of St. Andrew in Holborn, where they were baptized into the Church of England.

But even if it be a question of race and not religion, Disraeli was not the first Jewish peer by ninety years. The first was an Irish peer, regular Lord Eardley. His grandfather, Senor Abundante, a Portuguese immigrant, who like young Benjamin Disraeli had been made a Christian by a parent who had quarrelled with the elders of his synagogue.

GIRLS ADVISED AS TO CHOOSING HUSBANDS

A Knowledge of Eugenics Will Prevent Falling in Love With Wrong Man.

London, March 22. — The authorities of the Bedford College for Women invited the Eugenics Education Society to send them a lecturer, and a few days ago a bevy of girl students laughed and blushed while Professor Inge talked to them of eugenics.

A knowledge of eugenics, he said, would tend to prevent girls from falling in love with the wrong men. It was frequently objected that the science constituted an undue interference with an individual's free choice in falling in love and marrying women. "To a certain extent," said the professor, "I sympathize with that objection, but I do think a certificate of sound intellect should be a condition of things insisted upon before marriage. Unconsciously, as things are now, we are much guided by eugenic considerations."

Generally a man's attraction for a woman is attributable to his fine and strong physique, and in the same way the points of beauty in women are those which belong to her womanhood. But some training in eugenics would enable a young man or woman to detect those signs of degeneracy which are obvious to the scientific eye.

The professor drew a gloomy picture of the outlook for the coming generation. If the process continues at its present rate in three more generations the English stock, which a few years ago was one of the best in the world, will be one of the poorest.

In all my travels I have never seen poorer specimens of humanity than those in the English slums. It has become a serious problem that the more civilized the state the more the population is increased from the most undesirable stocks.

The professor noted that the birth rate in this country had declined from 36 in 1878 to 26 in 1909. This was due in part to mortality, in part to prudence which operated in deterring marriage and in restraining the size of families, and it was possible there had been a slight decline owing to hereditary habits. A civilization advanced both death rate and birth rate decreased. While the death rate was eugenic the birth rate was not, for the greatest decline occurred in the best parts of the population.

The loss of the prosperity of a country was not the amount of exports or imports, not the power of its army or navy, not the diffusion of amount of its wealth, not the efficiency of its education, but the kind of man and woman it turned out. Speaking of positive duties, he said every man or woman who had reason to think that he or she was exceptionally well endowed with the body or mind or character ought to think it a duty to marry and have children.

With regard to the negative side, there were certain conditions, such as insanity, epilepsy, deafness, blindness, which should prevent marriage, but they ought not to be too scrupulous on some of these points, because physical health was not everything and there were a great many families with some physical defect who nevertheless were in many ways most useful to the community. It would be undesirable for highly conscientious people to inquire too closely whether their had some weak spot in their constitution and abstain from marriage on that account. A certain amount of sound health, however, ought to be insisted upon. In human affairs, health was more important than a marriage settlement.

MARS' CANALS AND SCIENCE

Theory Advanced That They Are Mere Fissures.

London, March 22. — The discussion whether the canals on Mars are really stupendous engineering works of a superior race or mere fissures in the Martian surface continues to interest the European scientific world. Prof. Scartarini, the Swedish physicist of the Nobel Institute, defends in the Deutsche Review the latter theory. In support he produced a map of the canals caused by earthquakes in Sicily and Calabria, showing a network of straight lines strikingly similar in appearance to Mars' canal system.

Prof. Lowell, of Arizona, objects that the canals are too long to be explained as superficial fissures. The longest terrestrial earthquake crevice is only 375 miles long, whereas the Martian canal known as Phobos is calculated to be 2,200 miles. To this Arrhenius replies that he has no doubt that the west coast of South America, a straight line running north and south between Africa, Chile and the Straits of Magellan, is nothing but a gigantic chasm equalling in length the Phobos canal on Mars.

Other great crevices in the earth's crust, he argues, doubtless exist, but they are not known because they may be situated in regions inaccessible so far to scientific research, or even at the bottom of the ocean. The great length of the Mars canals Arrhenius explains by saying that Mars is at a further stage of development than the earth and also by the different physical conformation of the planet as compared with the earth.
