Duncan C. Ross.

sat together in the Ontario Legislature
and later in the House of Commons.

DIED IN TORONTO
Former Well-Known London Travel-
ler's Death Was Unexpected.
The funeral took place yesterday in
Toronto of Mr. George E. Ferris, who
lived at 162 Westminister avenue. The
deceased had been ill for some
months, but his sudden death was un-
expected. He was born in England,
but moved to Toronto when quite young,
joining the firm of John D. Ivey & Co.,
formerly of this city. For twenty-one
years he was with this firm, travelling
over the northern part of Ontario, where
he was known by every businessman in
that district as a careful, capable and
industrious traveller.
He was actively connected with the
Travellers' Association and a prominent
member of the "Thistle Lawn Bowling
Club of Toronto. Many travellers of this
city knew him for his sterling qualities
and genial manner. Twelve years ago
he married Miss Ida M. Adams, daugh-
ter of Mr. and Mrs. John Adams, of this
city. She survives him, along with one
two-year-old daughter, three sisters and
one brother, all of Toronto.
The services were conducted by the
Rev. J. S. Broughall, of St. Stephen's
rectory. Six travellers of the John D.
Ivey Company acted as pallbearers.

NEW PAVEMENT
KING STREET EAST
Board of Works Recommends
That Asphalt Be Initiated
by the Council.

NEW DRINKING FOUNTAIN
One Will Be Placed at Corner of
Richmond and Queen's Avenue—
Meeting of No. 2 Committee.

An asphalt pavement on King street,
from Adelaide to the fair grounds, was
recommended to be initiated by the city
council at a meeting of the board of
works last night.
The matter was brought up by Ald.
Mitchell, who suggested that the pave-
ment be laid.
"There is a great deal of traffic on this
street," he declared. "The present street
is very bad, and I think we should
initiate a pavement there."
The council agreed to this. The
property owners, on the adoption of this
course, will have an opportunity of pe-
titioning against the pavement if they
so desire.

Locating a Fountain.
The location of the fountain
caused some discussion. One is to be lo-
cated near Richmond and Dundas
streets. Those who oppose to placing
it at this intersection, and Ald. Mit-
chell suggested that it be placed on
Queen's avenue, between Richmond and
Dundas streets, near Richmond. Ald.
Saunders particularly favoring this.
However, it was decided to place it on
Queen's avenue.

City Engineer Wright submitted a re-
port on Victoria street, and stated that
it would require approximately \$500 to
straighten this street out to its origi-
nal shape. He also reported that the fence
on both sides of the street encroached
on city property, and that as much as
ten feet of the street should be properly
fixed.

There was some discussion as to the
best method of procedure, but it was
finally recommended that a gravel road
be initiated there. This means that the
street will be straightened and graded
also.

IN DANGER OF COLLISION.
Engineer Wright called attention to the
dangerous condition of the corner near
the Eglinton street crossing of the Grand
Trunk. At the present time it is al-
most impossible to come coming, and
this materially increases the dan-
ger of a very dangerous crossing at
night. He has written to Assistant
Superintendent Davidson and the latter
has taken the matter up with the
officials at once.

On the recommendation of Mr. Wright
it was decided to initiate a sewer, from
Maitland street to connect the Horton
and Sincere street sewers.
The opening survey in West London
created a long discussion, but it was de-
cided to take no action until Mr. A. A.
Y. Sincere could be interviewed
regarding the opening of some of the
streets.
