If you stood on the Dundas street hill, facing West London, and lifted up your voice and yelled with all your might at old Tecumseh Park the question, "Will London have a good Canadian League baseball team this year?" it is altogether probable that echo would answer you with the same question; in fact you would think it remarkable if it answered otherwise, yet despite this, London is going to have a good team this year, and if you drop around in the vicinity of Tecumseh Park during the summer months, the echoes you will hear then will leave no

Although it is a little early yet to speak with such optimism, the local fans can be assured that London will deliver the goods in the Canadian League this summer, and if the little old rag emblematic of the championship is not reposing in the city on the Thames by next September-but really there is no if about it.

The London Baseball Club has organized for next summer, with the following officers: Honorary president, Hon. C. S. Hyman; president, Samuel Stevely; vicepresident, A. E. Somerville; secretary, F. C. Buzzell; treasurer, G. B. Patteson; executive committee, Geo. H. O'Nell, Thomas Gillean and H. T. Reason; director, 3 A. Carling. The secretary is getting busy, and contracts have been sent to a num ber of players. Many of the contracts have been returned unsigned, and letters accompanying them state that the salary mentioned is too small.
