

TRAVERS FAILS TO MAKE IT CLEAR

Special Session of Farmers Bank Inquiry to Probe Stock Issue.

BORROWED ON NOTES

Statement That Treasury Board Had Been Paid Out of Subscription Only True in Form.

Toronto, Jan. 14.—At a special session of the Farmers' Bank inquiry this morning Sir William Meredith examined W. R.
