

CANADIANS NOW WELL SUPPLIED

No Extra Clothing Comforts Needed For Troops In France.

LUXURIES ARE WELCOME

Queen Asks Canada For Comforts For Soldiers in Hospitals.

(Special Cable to The Advertiser.) London, March 31.—Sir George Perley, aided by the Canadian Press and the London troops with further comforts, said the troops were certainly well equipped and supplied with warm clothing by the Canadian Government, but during the abnormal winter at Salisbury they no doubt were glad of the extra things such as were provided for British troops everywhere. This is now changed, however, and the extra things already here or on the way will be sufficient for present requirements.

Tobacco and Sweets Welcome.

The war office directed the equipment states that all troops at the front, including Canadians, are well supplied. There is no item of clothing or necessaries or a luxury which can be recommended for provision by private enterprise. Sir George added that no doubt extra socks and colored handkerchiefs will always be useful. We ought also to supply such things as tobacco, sweets, games and magazines. Incidentally, playing cards are forbidden at the front.

No More Woollens.

The Queen commands our co-operation in making known in Canada that the necessity for woollen goods for the Queen's needwork guild no longer exists, but there is an increased demand for comforts for wounded soldiers in hospitals. Several thousand more beds have to be fully equipped. Over a million garments have been received during the last seven months, which the Queen describes as "a truly marvellous proof of the sympathy with the cause of the Allies in every corner of the civilized world."

Royal Praise.

Her majesty's response to this generous response, a determination on the part of the women of the Empire to emulate the magnificent spirit of loyalty which the monarch of Greater Britain has given to the world.

James P. Powell, one of London's oldest printers, died suddenly at his home, 644 King street, last evening, following an attack of apoplexy.

He had been down town all afternoon, and after having dinner with one of his sisters returned home, complaining of having a cold and feeling pains in his head, and lay down on a sofa. Later he became worse and went to bed, his sister getting up to apply to his head. When she returned, about 10 o'clock, she found him unconscious and soon after he died.

Mr. Powell was unmarried. He had worked for The Advertiser and in many other offices. Besides two sisters, Miss Mary and Mrs. Roach, both of this city, he leaves three brothers, Michael, of Ottawa; Fred, now with the first contingent in France, and Frank, of St. Michael's College, Toronto, morning funeral will be held on Friday morning at St. Mary's Church and interment will be made in St. Peter's Cemetery.

Body Interred at Grand Pre Beside That of Her Husband.

Grand Pre, N. S., March 31.—The funeral service of Mrs. Eunice Borden, mother of Sir Robert Borden, premier of Canada, was held at her home this afternoon at 3 o'clock. The service was conducted by two Wolfville clergymen, Rev. R. E. Fox and Rev. G. W. Milne, of the Church of England and Presbyterian Church, respectively.

Interment took place later in the old Presbyterian burying ground here, and Mrs. Borden's remains will rest beside those of her husband, who was buried fifteen years ago.

The funeral was largely attended, a special train from Halifax bringing a number of friends of Sir Robert Borden and his family.

Many floral tributes were laid on the casket.

The chief mourners were Sir Robert L. Borden and his brother, H. C. Borden, of Ottawa.

A special memorial service for the late Mrs. Borden will be held at Wolfville on Sunday.

PNEUMONIA CAUSED MANY DEATHS IN CITY THIS WINTER

28 of 99 Who Succumbed in London Died of Pneumonia.

Pneumonia, in its several forms, was responsible for more than a score of deaths in London during the month that ended today. The difference between the city clerk's office show a record of 99 deaths during the month, and of this number no less than 28 were attributed to pneumonia, according to the doctors' statements filed with each death return.

Tuberculosis was the agency that caused the deaths of six, while meningitis carried off three. Two of these

were of the spinal meningitis character, one of them being Pte. Alexander, of the 15th Battalion, and the other a child, while the third case was given as meningitis only.

Vital Statistics.

Vital statistics tabulations for March show that marriages were less than a year ago, while deaths and births were higher. The difference between births and deaths shows a natural increase in the city's growth of 54.

CLOSING HOTELS TO SOLDIERS INJUSTICE, SAYS MAJ.-GENERAL

"Making Distinction That Is Most Unfair—Men Going To Front To Die For Country Should at Least Have Same Privileges as Civilians," Declares Lessard.

"I think the Government proposal to close all hotels to soldiers a great injustice to men who are serving their country. It is making a distinction that is most unfair. Men who are going to the front to fight and die for their country should at least be entitled to the privileges that civilians enjoy. Personally I favor strongly the dry campaign."

Major-General Lessard, who is here inspecting the forces training at Queen's Park, expressed himself as above. The advertisement today, which has been going on splendidly all through the eastern division, and that the men who are enlisting are, as a whole, a splendid lot of soldiers.

More Canadians Enlisting.

"A peculiar thing I have noticed lately is that the percentage of young Canadians is increasing very rapidly. In the first call there about 75 per cent of those who enlisted were British-born and 25 per cent from Canada. Now the figures are just reversed. We are now getting a splendid lot of young men. In many places so many young men are offering that the commanding officers are going slowly and taking their pick of the Allies in every corner of the civilized world."

Asked regarding the recruiting in London of another squadron of Mounted Rifles, the major-general stated that the matter is still under consideration at Ottawa.

The major-general spoke in the highest terms of the manner in which the second contingent of British troops with the special militia police in looking after the men training there, and thought that a similar arrangement might work just as well in London.

Major-General Lessard and Major-General Steele were the two officers being considered for the command of the second contingent. Both have had wide experience, and Major-General Lessard spoke in high terms of Major-General Steele and the work he has done.

Freight Steamer Ultimatum From Japan Is Feared

Liner Flaminian On Way To Capetown—All of Crew Is Saved.

[Canadian Press.] London, March 31.—The liner Flaminian, with a general cargo from Glasgow to Capetown, was sunk off the Scilly Isles on Monday, March 29, by the German submarine U-28. The members of the crew were saved.

The Flaminian, which was reported sunk last night, had no passengers on board. Her crew of 38 men took to the boats and were picked up by the Danish steamer Finlandia, and landed at Højbyen this morning.

Tried to Escape.

The Flaminian sighted the U-28 at 11:30 o'clock Monday afternoon. The crew at once prepared to lower the boat, and at the same time the submarine was seen to be firing. The ship was easily overhauled her, however, and fired three shots, signalling her to stop.

The Flaminian was stopped and the crew, abandoning all personal belongings, got off in small boats. The submarine then fired ten shots at the steamer. These were expected to be ineffective, and accordingly a torpedo was discharged. This sent the Flaminian to the bottom.

Another Reported Gone.

Cardiff, Wales, March 31.—The Cardiff Echo declares that the British steamer Crown of Castile has been torpedoed and sunk off the Scilly Islands.

The British steamer Flaminian was of 2,218 tons. Shipping records located her at London on March 3.

PLACE WIRE UNDER SOIL

Public Utilities Commissioners, Telegraph, Telephone Men Hold Confab.

PROVISION MADE FOR THIS

Construction of Conduits When Hydro System Introduced in London.

Public utilities commissioners and representatives from the private power, telephone and telegraph companies of the city will get together this afternoon on a proposition to place all wires in the downtown district underground.

When the hydro-electric system was introduced into London in 1901, provision was made for undergrounding the construction of conduits. These ducts have so far remained idle, but it is now proposed to have all wires, both power and communication, buried.

Just what proposition will be submitted by the commissioners seems to be somewhat of a mystery. Chairman Philip Pocock, who is to act as spokesman for the commission, informed The Advertiser today that merely a discussion of a very quiet character would be the order of the day.

"I suppose that we will arrive at a similar agreement to the one recently put into force in Hamilton," said Mr. Pocock. "There each company pays its share. For instance, if there are three companies, and each company uses one of them, then its share will be one-tenth of the total cost."

Ratepayers Credited.

The chairman expounded this statement by one that the ratepayers, who were assessed for the undergrounding, would be credited with their respective shares of the money paid by the outside companies.

When hydro was first introduced into London it was proposed to have the wires in the downtown district underground. For this \$9,000 was appropriated, and this money was applied to the undergrounding of the wires.

In addition to the general conduit program that it is proposed to inaugurate, there is also a provision of an offer being made to the Bell Telephone Company in order that all underground work can be under the control of the utilities commission.

Although the Chinese originally declared their determination to discuss only twelve articles of the Japanese, they are now talking of articles beyond this number. The Shanghai press reports that the four articles of this first group already have been accepted with certain minor modifications, which have been transmitted from here by the Japanese minister.
