

COUPLE ADVISED TO SEEK PEACE

Justice Requests Ekfrid Man and Woman To Settle Own Matters.

After hearing the evidence for the plaintiff yesterday afternoon in the alimony action of Mrs. Mabel Gibbs against her husband, William Ellis Gibbs, a farmer of Ekfrid township, Mr. Justice Riddell, presiding at the non-jury supreme court sittings, requested both parties to get together in an effort to settle matters between themselves.

Mrs. Gibbs, after telling her story of neglect, declared she would not go back to live with him because she had been told that he accused her of poisoning his food.

J. C. Elliott, K. C., counsel for Gibbs, after a short conference with his client, stated that he proposed to put in no evidence other than Mr. Gibbs' examination for discovery. Mr. Elliott also stated that his client authorized him to say that he did not now believe that his food had ever been tampered with by his wife.

"Then there is nothing in this case for the plaintiff to object to," observed the court.

J. M. McEvoy, K. C., who, with W. B. Henderson, acted for Mrs. Gibbs, stated that he would be satisfied if Gibbs signed a statement which he had given verbally to Mr. Elliott, pay for the upkeep of his wife and child and for the litigation, Mr. McEvoy then suggested that husband and wife get together in the matter, the court heartily endorsing this sentiment and stating that he would allow the case to rest at that point for the time being. He would like to hear further evidence about it some time before the close of the court.

Mr. McEvoy then wanted to know why Gibbs had not given evidence himself. His examination for discovery showed counsel claimed that the defendant was trying to accuse his wife of slow poisoning because food she had given him after an illness did not do her good.

Asked Her to Come Back.

Mrs. Gibbs, the first witness, said she was married in June, 1918, and resided with her husband at Appin. A son was born in July, 1922. Five or six months after her marriage her husband and she had an election argument, and Mr. Gibbs told the sister not to return to the house. Witness declared her mother was also forbidden the house when she tried to make peace. Her husband wrote a letter to her mother, for which she asked him to apologize. Mrs. Gibbs said in March, 1923, her husband was ill, and his sister came to the house, causing trouble by slanderous talk about witness. He stayed home but a week after the nurse left.

Mrs. Gibbs said her husband went to Appin the last week in May, taking all his clothes but his good suit. After that he slept at his father's.

The judge—Why didn't your husband live with you?

A—He said he wouldn't come back unless his mother, father and sisters could come with him.

Witness said she went to live with her sister, Mrs. Brownlee, in June.

Refused to Return.

Q.—Did he write you to come back?

A—Yes. I was told that my husband accused me of trying to poison him. That is the reason I won't go back to him.

Dr. Dewar of Melbourne said Mrs. Gibbs was in a highly nervous condition when he was called in to attend her. The doctor also attended Mr. Gibbs when he became ill with the flu.

She wrote a letter on June 18, asking him to come back to her and the baby, but he did not do so. She then took the matter up with her solicitors. At the time her husband refused to stay at home, witness became quite nervous and couldn't sleep, she said.

Questioned by Mr. Elliott, for the defence, witness said her sister-in-law didn't help her in the house. She had liked her at that time, but not now. Her husband had been a faithful man as far as women were concerned. Witness returned.

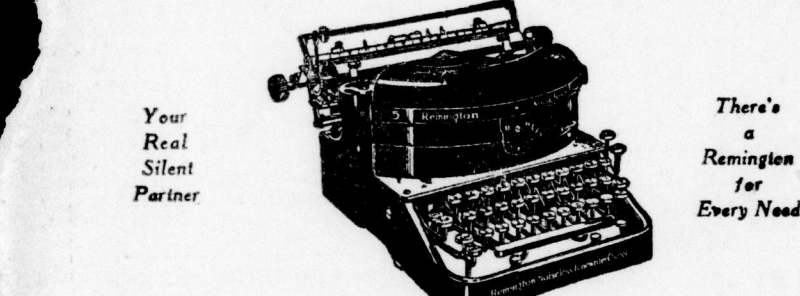

How Western Ontario Voted In 1919 and 1921

NEW INDICTMENTS AGAINST BANKERS

Contents of Charges Involving Directors Are Shrouded in Mystery.

RUM SHIP LOSES

While the grand jury was considering the matter today the trial of Charles F. Smith of Montreal, Home Bank director, in the county criminal court, was held up.

RETRIAL ORDERED IN DAMAGE SUIT

Former Physical Director Is Plaintiff in Civil Case.

St. Thomas, Oct. 22.—Three civil actions completes the docket for the fall sittings of the supreme court of Ontario being held in the county courthouse next Monday afternoon.

The first action is the rehearing of the \$10,000 claim for damages and interest, entered by H. A. McKee, former physical director of the local Y. M. C. A., against the Standard Paving Company of Ottawa and John and Louis Lutvak, formerly of this city. McKee lost an eye when his bicycle and an auto driven by Lutvak collided. The case was first heard last fall.

The second action is a dispute over land at Port Stanley. Irvine McNeice and his wife, Eleanor McNeice, being the plaintiffs and John Mitchell of Southwold, the defendants. McKee entered a home on the property in question at Port Stanley, and were later sued by Mrs. Louisa F. Clark, who claimed that the building extended on to her premises. Judgment and damages were awarded Mrs. Clark, and the plaintiff in this action is now suing Mitchell for not properly defining the lot.

The last case brings in the Pere Marquette as defendant. Fire started on the right-of-way in the long gress and spread over the farms of Duncan L. McMillan and Neil F. Campbell, farmers in Dunwich, who claim that 25 acres of land was spoiled for agricultural purposes, 250 rods of fence destroyed and 20 acres of pasture land lost.

JUDGMENT RESERVED ON ST. JOHNS PAPERS

Journals Warned Not To Publish Articles On Sir Richard Squires.

St. Johns, Nfld., Oct. 22.—The proprietors and editors of the Daily News and Evening Telegram appeared in the supreme court today to show cause why they should not be attached for contempt. The action arose in consequence of articles which appeared in those papers following the finding by a grand jury of no bill against Sir Richard Squires. The full bench heard arguments of counsel and judgment will be reserved.

The chief justice intimated that as crown counsel had stated in court, that the case against Sir Richard Squires would be brought to the grand jury at a later date it would be improper for him to be tried in the newspapers, and that if in future any article appeared that might prejudice the case, counsel should bring the matter to the notice of the court and the court would deal with it.

HUNDREDS IN SERVICE TO RETIRE THIS MONTH

Calder Act Expires On October 31—May Withdraw All Payments.

Ottawa, Oct. 22.—Hundreds of civil servants throughout the country are retiring this month under the provision of the Calder act, which expires at the end of October. The terms of this enactment are considered to be more liberal than those of the superannuation act, because in addition to the retiring allowance, civil servants may withdraw their payments into the retirement fund.

Drastic Orders To Stop Padding

Mr. Fitzgerald has notified all deputies of this order either by mail or telephone and has supplied them with blank warrants.

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Car Races Wolf and Makes Kill

The driver stepped on the gas and gave chase, and after a run of about a mile, one of the animals turned off into the bush, but the other stayed on the roadway, muzzling from side to side with the car on its heels, until the front wheel hit it and the car passed over its body. The men brought the pelt to the city to claim the bounty.

I. O. U.'S CARRIED IN CLERK'S CASH

Startling Testimony Is Given at Probe in Hamilton Tax Scandal.

Hamilton, Oct. 22.—How checks and I. O. U.'s of officials of the city of Hamilton tax department were carried for lengthy periods by cashiers there made for rather startling testimony at the afternoon's session of the civic probe. Cecil Stewart, one of the cashiers, said he had cashed and carried for thirteen months a check of \$110, for Robert Griffith, deputy tax collector. He had also later cashed an I. O. U. of \$40 for Mr. Griffith, and carried this for four months. Tax collector Kerr had also had checks and I. O. U.'s carried.

Mr. Griffith, he continued, was asked to redeem the check one week after it was cashed, as a request had been made that it be not submitted to a bank for payment.

Because of a misunderstanding Mr. Stewart said he never again approached his departmental head regarding the checks, but was resigned to make good and lose himself. He carried Mr. Griffith's check and I. O. U. until disclosures of dishonesty were made in the city tax department about one month ago. Then the check and the I. O. U. of \$40 of four months' standing were promptly redeemed by Mr. Griffith.

DISMISS ACTION AGAINST WALKER

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TWICE SEEKS SUICIDE, IS GIVEN PRISON TERM

HOME BANK ASSETS ARE GIVEN BIG BOOST

New Orleans Financiers Make Offer For Railroad Property.

Toronto, Oct. 22.—One of the largest of the "slow" assets of the defunct Home Bank of Canada is going to bring a large sum almost immediately into the coffers of the liquidators, and ultimately will add to the credit of the depositors and shareholders. This asset is known as the New Orleans Railway deal in which the bank is interested to the amount of \$1,100,000.

A special despatch from New Orleans said local financiers there were now in direct communication with Toronto and had made an offer for the purchase of the railway through the Home Bank liquidators.

INJURIES ARE FATAL TO DUTTON FARMER

Angus McCallum Dies in Victoria Hospital From Fractured Skull.

Angus McCallum of Dutton died in Victoria hospital shortly after 8 o'clock last night of injuries received when struck by a piece of steel that broke off a threshing machine and struck him on the right side of the head, fracturing his skull.

The accident happened on Monday while threshing operations were in progress at the McCallum farm near Dutton. The injured man was brought to the hospital shortly after noon and an operation was performed. The man never regained consciousness following the operation. His skull was severely fractured on the right side and doctors' efforts were to no avail.
