Attack on Jagersfontein Lord Roberts Will Punish Heavily Townspeople Who Aided Boers. A Number of Small Actions Reported From Various Places. London, Oct. 22.—Lord Roberts reports from Pretoria, under date of October 21, that the Boers who attacked Jagersfontein succeeded in releasing the Boer prisoners in the town before they were repulsed. Their loss was twenty, including Commandant Visser. The Boer sympathizers inside the town assisted the men killed and four wounded. A despatch to the Times from Zeeuwt, in Western Transvaal, and reports the loss of six men killed and ten wounded. Lieutenant, who has been fighting with and financing the Boers, near Koonstad, driving them off and inflicting considerable loss. A determined attack was made by the Boers on Naureimith, west of Jagersfontein. The Boers were repulsed. The attack was made on Thursday. Gen. Barton fought at Frederickstad, capturing several positions. He lost two men killed and four wounded. A despatch to the Times from Zeeuwt says that Von Hoosberg, an American lieutenant, who has been fighting with and financing the Boers, declares himself tired of the war. DEATH OF JOHN SHERMAN. Prominent Figure in United States Public Life Bemoaned. Washington, Oct. 22.—Hon. John Sherman, who for a period of 40 years occupied a prominent place in the legislative and administrative branches of public affairs in the United States, died here at 6:45 o'clock this morning of brain exhaustion. The funeral services over the remains will be held in the city and at Hansfield, Ohio. The interment will be in the family plot at that place, and will take place in all probability on Thursday, Oct. 26. Sherman was born in Lancaster, Ohio, May 10, 1823. In 1844 he was admitted to the bar. He was elected to congress, where he took his seat on December 3, 1855. He was president of the first Republican convention in Ohio, in the summer of 1856. In 1856 President McKinley appointed him secretary of state, but soon after taking up the portfolio ill-health compelled him to resign. In his eulogy on the dead man, President McKinley says: "The sense of bereavement that affects the public is direct that on the day of the funeral, the executive officers of the United States display the national flag at half-mast, and that the representatives of the United States in foreign countries shall pay in the manner appropriate tribute to the illustrious dead for a period of ten days."
