On September 23 she laid her course for New York. At 5 p.m. on September 28 she passed through a hurricane in mid-Atlantic, although it was noted that day the weather off the Atlantic was reported fine.

At midnight the wind shifted to the north-west with mishap at a point 152 miles from the coast of Ireland, where the cable was cut.

The cable was hauled up by the cable car which the American had towed 100 miles of cable previously laid westward from the Irish coast by the cable car in the month of May.

The weather was heavy and the Colonia was compelled to heave to for several days awaiting a fair day to enable her to make the final splice—

**FRUIT.**

At some points the cable was laid at a depth of nearly three miles below the surface of the sea. The quantities of material used in the manufacture of the cable were 1,411 tons of copper, 789,688 yards of gutta serena, 16,840 pounds of brass tape, iron wire, iron wire and preservative compound.

The signaling speed of this cable is said to be fifteen per cent greater than that of the old cable now being used in the Atlantic. The cost of the cable varied from \$1,000 to \$5,000 per mile according to the character of the ocean bed and depth of water; the great variation in cost being due to the different diameters and depths of the cables.

Cable in deep water is practically safe from material injury and the water does not seem to be so strong, so that the sections laid in deep water are of small size and less cost. The sections laid near shores are of massive con- struction and very expensive. In the vicinity of the shore of the coast of Newfoundland, a type of cable midway between the shore and cable is used.
