How the Mahdi Makes His Fight. LONDON, Feb. 8.—A Gaddi despatch says wounded prisoners brought here says the mahdi told his men the British were few in number, that the English soldiers would fight at the sight of the Arab separatists. The mahdi threatened to deprive them of food for forty days, saying if they were taken to military service by Allah's will and left unharmed. Five thousand of the mahdi's best troops were killed, many of them being wounded in the two recent battles. Many emirs are lying at Metemneh. The mahdi had twenty-two regiments of infantry, which had been taught by Ismail Pasha, who had been taught by the British at Cairo. The mahdi's army is still in the hands of the British.

Several Lives Lost and Nearly a Million Dollars' Worth of Property Destroyed. NEW BRUNSWICK, N.J., Feb. 7.—A collision occurred between a freight and an oil train on the iron bridge over the Pennsylvania railroad spanning the Karlov river, at 3 o'clock this morning, resulting in the loss of two lives, the destruction of a locomotive of one span of the bridge, and the burning of two factories, six dwellings and other local property amounting to nearly \$1,000,000.

The fire next extended to the large factory of the New Brunswick Fruit Jar company, which was quickly enveloped in flames and totally consumed.
