INCREASE OF \$252,000 IN COLLECTION OF CUSTOMS AND EXCISE DEPARTMENTS

Totals For 1922 Are \$3,147,78 6, Compared With \$2,895,000 For the Previous Year - Biggest Increase Found In Domestic Sales Tax and Import Sales Tax.

Customs and excise collections in the year 1922 increased by \$252,626.26 over the preceding year, the corresponding totals being \$3,147,786.48 for 1922, and \$2,895,130.22 for the previous year. The increase does not necessarily mean that the volume of business done through the port of London has increased in that ratio during the year, but rather that the special taxes imposed by the King Government are having their effect in the way of larger receipts.

The month of December furnishes a fair indication of the way this increased mpost works. In the month just ended the big difference in receipts compared with December of 1921 will be found in the classifications where the King Government added to the burdens upon the people.
