1/4 cupful sugar
1/2 cupful milk

l egg beaten Part Two-1 cupful sugar

teaspoonful salt 2 eggs 2 cupful milk teaspoonful vanille

1 teaspoonful soda Port One—Mix cocoa and sugar together, add milk to beaten egg, mix
all together, cock in double boiler until
quite thick. Cool.

Port Two — Cream Crisco, salt and
sugar until creamy. Add eggs, well
beaten. Mix well, add milk and vanilla.
Fold in flour sifted with soda. Mix
thoroughly with partone. Bake in two
layers.
