The Dominion Senators must consider their position quite as secure as that of the Legislative Councils of Nova Scotia, etc.

They would hardly dare try conviction of the Commons twice in one session.

The Yukon railway bill, after passing the lower house by a substantial majority, was thrown out by the Senate; and now the new federal franchise bill which had been vigorously debated in the Commons, does not suit them.

They do not object to the bill in its entirety, but they do object to the clause providing that in cases where the lists of voters, finally revised, have not been transmitted or received by the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery in time for the election commission, the provincial lists shall be used for the said election.

This clause, it was claimed, would seriously affect a vote in Nova Scotia in case the new lists were not prepared in time, as it would leave all Dominion officials without a vote under the provincial law.

The Senate proposed an amendment to the bill, and the Government refused to accept any further amendment, having already made several changes in the original bill at the request of the opposition; and also two governing bodies are at loggerheads again.

Another important matter is the franchise bill on the outcome of the present dispute. The plebiscite bill is worded so that the vote shall be taken on the new lists to be provided under the 1898 franchise act; but there is a possibility—a grave possibility, even—that the house will be prorogued without any franchise law being enacted.

In that case the whole plebiscite scheme will collapse, since, if there are no 1898 lists there can be no plebiscite vote on those lists.

The Senate is insisting on a heavy responsibility in this matter, and one which, we imagine, the government of the day will not hesitate to pass to them.
