IMPROVEMENTS TO BAPTIST CHURCH

Vestry to be Replaced by Larger Structure With Excellent Sunday School Accommodation, Banquet Hall, Ladies Parlor, etc.

During the past ten days or so a number of meetings have been held in connection with proposed extensions and renovations of the Baptist church. A number of plans have been discussed and the building committee have been authorized to make improvements up to \$7,500.

The plans involve a renewing of the wall on the north and west sides of the church, the removal of the old vestry which will be replaced by an addition 52 5/8 ft. to this part of the church edifice. The bell tower will be retained as now.

In the part to be reconstructed there will be basement and two floors. On the upper probably kitchen and banquet hall, with ladies parlor in the first floor, also vestry. The remaining portions will be devoted to class rooms for the Sunday School. The building committee is made up of Karl Freeman (Chairman), J. I. Foster, M. C. Foster, Wm. Stronach, John P. Morse (ch. of trustees), A. L. Beeler, Dr. Crowe, J. S. Moses, W. R. Miller.

NO BOWLING ALLEY YET

Lively Discussions Precipitated on Turning Court House Into Alley.—J. I. Foster Takes Over Building.—Ratepayers Meeting to be Called to Decide on Purchase by Town.

There has been considerable change in Court House propositions since our last issue. Mr. E. J. Muise of Annapolis purchased the shares owned by Mr. Kenneth Leslie, these representing a controlling interest in the property. Mr. Muise put men at work making alterations in the interior of the building so as to fit it up for a Bowling Alley.

This at once aroused local action and a meeting of protest was called. It was pointed out that although Mr. Leslie owned 54 shares out of the 100, Mr Muise had simply purchased stock to that amount and proceedings in remodelling without reference to other parties involved was irregular. A petition was gotten up to the effect that as the proposed bowling alley would be in a residential section of the town it would be detrimental to the interests of property-holders there. A resolution was also drawn up, moved by Dr. Armstrong and seconded by Councilor O. C. Jones and passed as follows:

WHEREAS by statutory enactment made more than fifty years ago the spring session of the Supreme Court and the fall session of the County Court must be held at Bridgetown, and

WHEREAS this procedure and arrangement has continued all these years, because it was more convenient to the central and eastern portion of the County of Annapolis, and

WHEREAS it still is more central and convenient to the greater portion of ratepayers who use the Courts,

THEREFORE RESOLVED that we,
