BADDECK, June 15th, 1880.

DEAR SIR,—I am requested by the General Committee appointed by the Baddeck Agricultural Society to communicate to the Board that, pursuant to a requisition authorized by the two Cape Breton members of their honorable Board, a meeting was held at Baddeck, consisting of representatives of nine of the existing Agricultural Societies in the Island, and at that meeting a majority voted that the Agricultural Exhibition for the Island of Cape Breton should be held at Baddeck this coming Fall.

That the Agricultural Society of Baddeck and the other Societies of this County are fully alive to carry out the undertaking to a successful issue, and will use every nerve to make the Exhibition a success should the Central Board confirm and select Baddeck as the place at which to hold it.

That the Committee represents Baddeck and the County of Victoria, and is in the interests of the whole Island as well as the delegation lately held at Whycocomagh, and are taking a very active part towards the advancement of the Exhibition.

That should the Exhibition be held elsewhere than at Baddeck, the interests of the large majority of the Island's agriculturists will be sacrificed to the minority, and could not be a success in exhibitors and exhibits.

That since the meeting called by the members of their honorable Board, and the decision that the Exhibition should be held at Baddeck, a much deeper and greater interest has been felt and taken in the advancement of the Exhibition, and the calculation now is that the scheme for the Island will now be carried out with every probability of success.

And, finally, that the Committee, after mature deliberation, are of opinion that full justice will be done the public visitors in the matter of accommodation and comfort.

I would also respectfully submit for the consideration of your honorable Board at its first meeting this communication and accompanying resolution of the General Committee.

At a meeting of the Exhibition Committee held this morning A. F. Haliburton, Esq., in the chair, it was resolved that John Ross, Esq., be requested to represent in a special manner this Committee at the meeting of the Central Board of Agriculture to be held at Halifax on Friday next. That he inform them that a Committee is at present preparing a Prize List. That such Prize List will be forwarded in time to be before the Board at its first meeting, and that such List will foot up the sum of \$2,500, of which amount the Government will contribute \$1,500 and this Committee \$1,000, and that it is the intention of this Committee to expend in addition to the amounts already stated the sum of at least \$500 in preparing suitable grounds and buildings for holding the Exhibition.

Also resolved that our Chairman be instructed to correspond with the Central Board on Exhibition matters generally.
