In 1947 women were admitted to examinations for entry into the diplomatic service, (1) although it is believed that before that date the late Miss Marjorie McKenzie, Dr. Skelton's Private Secretary, wrote and passed, on more than one occasion, the written examinations, more for her own satisfaction than for any other reason, although she did not aspire to be granted any Foreign Service Officer rank, until she was appointed as an F.S.O.l in 1946. (2)
