Right Hon. J. G. Diefenbaker (Prime Minister): Mr. Speaker, I should like to move, seconded by the Leader of the Opposition (Mr. Pearson):

That the speech of His Excellency the Governor General, Major General Georges Philias Vanier, D.S.O., M.C., C.D., together with the address of welcome made by the Prime Minister in the Senate chamber on September 15, 1959, be printed as an appendix to the official report of debates of the House of Commons, and form part of the permanent record of this parliament.

I might add in this connection that similar action was taken on April 12, 1946, when Right Hon. Mr. King made the same motion concerning the induction ceremony of Right Hon. Viscount Alexander of Tunis. I should in fairness point out that apparently the same course was not followed in connection with Mr. Massey, but on previous occasions it has taken place. I thought I ought to place that point before the house, and hope that this motion should be accepted.
