Some hon. Members: Shame!

Mr. Speaker: Order, please. There is not unanimous consent. The motion cannot be put.

Mr. Cossitt: Mr. Speaker, I rise on a point of order. The motion that has just been proposed is similar to the one I put yesterday which the hon. gentlemen opposite did not agree with at that time. There seem to be those on the government side who, I feel, are interfering with the privileges of the House by hiding their mouths behind their hands to cover their nays when the House tries to express legitimate views on legitimate matters arising under Standing Order 43. I accept, of course, that Standing Order 43 requires unanimous consent in order for the motion to be put, but I feel that the privileges of the House are being interfered with day after day by members on the opposite side when they cry no and remain anonymous.

The rules of the House do not permit a secret ballot, but in fact hon. members opposite are succeeding in doing this very thing by not identifying themselves when these votes arise. May I respectfully ask whether the Chair would consider the possibility of asking, in connection with proposed motions under Standing Order 43, firstly for the yeas and secondly for the nays.

Mr. Speaker: Order, please. I appreciate the suggestion that is being made by the hon. member for Leeds and it is one that has been made before. However, the practice is clear: what the Chair is required to do is to ascertain whether there is unanimous consent to move the motion. It is sufficient for this purpose if there is one nay. I wonder whether it would be appropriate to change the practice, call for the yeas and nays and count noses or heads. I think that the application of Standing Order 43 is complicated enough at the present time without making it more complicated.
