We have your letter of August 27th confirming our telephone conversation and have given consideration to the various questions raised. We regret that we cannot place our laboratory equipment at your disposal as you suggest. It would be too dangerous a precedent. In your second paragraph you speak of the "nebulous state of dielectric practice". I spoke of dielectric theory not practice, the practice is not nebulous. When we require a capacitance bridge we will have no difficulty in the design and construction of it, as the members of our staff have had a very wide experience in the construction and operation of standardizing equipment and the experience of the research laboratories of the Bureau of Standards at Washington is ours for the asking. The troubles we have experienced in cable testing have been due to deficiencies of the cable companies, and we have had no serious difficulty in overcoming them here.
