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THE partizan having received inftructions relative to the enemy's towns that are indebted to his commander, or that it is intended to lay them under contributions, he is to inform himfelf of the refidence of the principal nobility and richest inhabitants of these cities, and attempt by every means to get them into his possession, to keep as hostages : if he fucceeds, great advantages may accrue, either by exacting a confiderable ranfom, or exchanging them for prifoners of equal confequence : but no time to be thrown away in furprizing the antago+ nift's holpital, unless there be fome officer of note among the fick ; in that cafe, he should endeavour to carry him off only, as it will be running a risk to no purpole to attempt the whole, by employing a ftrong force and large expence for carriages, horfes, &c. belides the fick and wounded will be chargeable to maintain where provision and other neceffaries are fcarce; and can be of no use to their fovereign : it would rather be rendering the enemy an important fervice to eafe them of this burthen. i ionen bezon dagiodi di idi to ya

WHEN a commandant of rangers attacks, he is neither to give quarter, or take
