The keels of three new

built in this kingdom.

The commissioners for re-
ducing the national debt, since
the new powers given them
by the late act have been put
in force, purchase on an ave-

ated to that purpose.

The sheriffs and the grand

lony, in New South Wales,

ground, by uncommon labour,
had in some places been fer-
tilized. Several bipeds, and
a few quadrupeds, had been
discovered in the interior
part of the country; but the
natives continued so shy, that
governor Phillips was afraid
to venture far on discoveries.
A complaint, which ended in
diarrhea, had, we are sorry
to learn, been prevalent
throughout the colony, and
carried off several persons,
chiefly convicts.
