Adelaide, Upper Canada, July 28th, 1832.

Dear father and mother, brothers and Sisters,
I hope this will find you in good health as it leaves me pleasant—I have been very well ever since I left England: we was seven weeks coming to Montreal, five weeks more coming up to Montreal, I have got 100 acres of Land at 2 dollars per acre and $\frac{1}{4}$ to be paid for at the end of three y'rs, and the rest in 3 y'rs more; in English money it comes to £41. 13s. 4d. in all; tell my brother James I saw Richard Carter and his wife at Little York, they are doing very well and said this would be a good opportunity for them to have come out this Country. I should for all my brothers to come here for here is plenty of work, and no doubt but we shall do very well after next harvest. Edward Boxall and his wife and Wm. Philips from Merston and me have built us a shantee, and lives and works all together on our own land; we have got above two acres cleared and shall sow 6 or 7 acres of wheat this Autumn, and more in the spring. Dear Father I should like to have a malt mill and a few pounds of thread, and above all things a Newfoundland Dog for myself, and take this letter to Merston to Philips father and tell him to be sure to bring him a dog to catch the Deer and tell you what time of the year he means to come out so that you may all come together. Answer this as soon as you receive it; if you come in the spring or fall be sure you come by new York, and from there to Buf-
