The subject of our interview was born in the neighborhood of Newcastle in 1832, and was early in life engaged in the mines. He heard stories of the coal discoveries in the wonderful Rockies of the northern portion of the continent of America and at 30 years of he determined to stry his luck.

"I went up into the Rockies to work in the coal mines." Mr. Ferguson resumed, "and altogether I was out there about 30 years.
