Officials and Civic Employees Given Increases Totaling \$2,398-City Solicitor Johnston, Assistant Assessment Commissioner Lyon, Assistant City Architect Price Remembered-Board of Control Liberally Criticized for Stinginess - Discussion on Estimates of Health Department.

At their special session to deal with the draft estimates the city council yesterday afternoon passed salary in-creases for various officials, which totaled \$2398. The feature of the meeting was the criticisms which were leveled at the board of control for their numerous deductions in the esti-timates as originally submitted by the departments. The controllers vigor-ously resented these attacks, claiming that none of the services had suffered from their revision. The estimates of the health department was the chief battle ground, and the entire evening session was given up in a discussion as to, whether the council should authorize the board's cut of \$20,000 over the general expenditures. At times the debate waxed warm and bit-ter, but when the vote was finally taken the necessary two-thirds vote could not he secured to overthrow the bar
