WHEAT EXPORTS ARE ENDANGERED

representatives from the three provinces, also passed on the question. They do not recommend a fixed price, but are anxious to have their pound of wheat. They would have a grain board formed to market Canada's crop and such federal government financial assistance as would guarantee the full market value to the farmer.

Must Find Money.

Money is the solution of the problem. Europe wants wheat, but outside a few countries wants it on credit. The United States has the wheat, the money and much shipping, but their price is fixed at \$2.25. Canada cannot give further credit to Europe, nor is it possible to borrow money in the United States to place Canada's crop in Europe when the United States wants the same market.
