FINE OLD RESIDENCE IN PICKERING BURNS

West York License Board Are Energetic—Parish Priest in East Toronto Dies.

JACKSON'S POINT, July 28.—The railway did it. Herbie Lennox made them give a two-cent rate. This was the ingenious explanation offered in some quarters for the demoralization of the service of the Toronto & York Radial line to the marriage of the complete success of the North York Conservative picnic on Friday. But the great body of the pleasure-makers harbored no such suspicions, and the dark whisperings of a Grit plot, hatched to compass the discomfiture of Aurora's favorite statesman, failed to arouse any general indignation.

The picnic was a great success in spite of all the trappings of the transportation system, which landed many hundreds at the grounds when the sun was low in the west, and returned them to the family hearthstone in time for breakfast. Hundreds more didn't get to Jackson's Point at all, but for all that about 500 stalwarts, their wives and families, from all over the broad riding were present.

The two Grand Trunk specials from Stouffville picked up about 1500 picknickers along the line, and to the strains of music from the Aurora and 14th Battalion bands marched in triumphal procession from Sutton.

The steamer Islay brought over about 100 hardy navigators from Barrie, despite the high wind and rough waters which kept away many of the steam launches and pleasure boats.

The program of sports was well looked after by Dr. Stevenson of Aurora, and while the games were interfered with by the unavoidable absence of players stilled at points along the route, there were some good contests and excellent entertainment.

Those who had come in wagons and buggies, or by train, were envied by those who had not. Cars which left Aurora at noon, or later, did not reach the Point until 6 p.m. The blockade was tight for several hours, as far as Keswick, and hundreds of the passengers, weary of the wait, walked in the last three or four miles, only to find a number of cars jammed with picknickers, some of whom had to wait for hours before a vacant car would return.

DRUMMER SNACK OUTING FUN GALORE AT ALTON

Friday and Saturday Given Over to Program of Sports and Frivolity.

The sixth annual outing of the Drummers Snack Club was held at Alton on Friday and Saturday. The majority of the members and their friends traveled to Alton by an evening train on Friday, arriving in time for the big concert with which the proceedings of the Snack Club always open.

At Alton the crowd was met by the Alton Citizens' Band and a bevy of little girls in white dresses with broad red ribbons, who, with the band and a large orchestra, escorted the trainload of people to the camping ground.

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LOCAL FRUIT MARKET.

The past week was only a moderately heavy one down on the fruit trade in the Ontario market. The Ontario and Canadian fruit changed hands at the firm prices generally maintained for all kinds of fruit. Notwithstanding the heavy rain, the quality of strawberries was a good average one, there was a steady demand for the good produce, and double quantities would have found a ready market.

At the beginning of the present season, the Ontario market was well cleaned up, and this in a large measure was due to the firm prices generally.

Mr. Dawson, senior member of the Dominion Commission, regards the outlook generally for the apple crop in Ontario as average. In Huron County alone Mr. Dawson estimates the output at 250,000 barrels. In Prince Edward County, where the crop is generally better, there will be a good crop of apples. The raspberry season, just opening up, will be fairly good, but prices will be high. On Saturday the prevailing price for the Ontario fruit was:

Apples, per bushel, \$1.00 to \$1.25; Peaches, per bushel, \$1.00 to \$1.25; Raspberries, per bushel, \$1.00 to \$1.25; Strawberries, per bushel, \$1.00 to \$1.25.

COMMISSIONERS ASKING FOR SOME INFORMATION

Railways Requested to Supply Answers in Regard to Tariff Arrangements.

OTTAWA, July 28.—(Special.)—An order has been issued by the railway commissioners, requiring every railway in Canada to furnish the board with the following information within three months:

The railway company, or companies, with which it has direct connection in Canada, and the point, or points, with which such connection is made.

The railway company, or companies, with which every company has joint freight tariffs filed with the board, giving the number of the said tariffs and the junction point thru which they apply.

Whether every such company is willing, to extend the scope of such joint tariffs by routing, also thru the junctions, if any, not already utilized, or to arrange joint tariffs thru such other points. If not, to state fully its reasons therefor.

Any and all railway company or companies with which every such company has not joint tariffs, and whether such company is prepared to negotiate with such connecting company or companies for joint tariffs. If not, to state fully the reasons for objecting.
