

RACING BOARD BULLETIN.

IMPORTANT RULINGS OFFICIALLY PROMULGATED.

When a Rider May Teach a Novice to Ride a Wheel and Still Remain an Amateur—The Board and Board Races—Another Batch of Professionals—Sanctions and Officals.

Chairman George H. Orr has handed out the regular weekly official bulletin of the C.W.A. Racing Board, dated May 15, 1896, which reads:

Sanctions—May 25, Georgetown, five amateur races.

W. P. Scarff, Guelph, has been appointed an official timekeeper for District No. 4, Westmount, N. Westminister, has been appointed on the District Board in place of W. S. Keay, resigned.

The following are declared professional bicycle riders: Thos. A. Johnston, E. W. Bradley, W. J. Jeffers, T. G. Moody, Jr., all of Victoria, B.C., at their own request; Cecil Elliott, Toronto, under clause B, and G. M. Hall of Galt, under clause B, and suspension placed on the latter rider has been removed. The suspension pending investigation of Roy Gordon has been removed, as he has approved the charge of violation.

The following are declared amateur bicycle riders: A. B. Palmerston; John Anderson, Toronto, and Harold B. Lyon, Toronto.

An impression prevails that the Racing Board will rule upon prize values, and the clause in the declaration regarding the make of wheel a rider uses in amateur road races. Such is not the case. The Racing Board has no jurisdiction over the make of wheels used by amateurs competing outside of Canada in amateur road races. The board has been asked from many quarters concerning riders who are employed in amusements, and other places, for the purpose of instructing beginners how to ride. If a rider is paid a salary, or receives cash for a remuneration for the purpose of teaching bicycle riding, he is an amateur. A rider may, however, teach a person how to ride a wheel for the purpose of effecting a sale of same, but he must not accept cash for his services in teaching.

BI-CYCLE BRIEFS.

The Argonaut Bicycle Club wheels to New Toronto today, leaving the boat house at 2 p.m.

Calumet Club cyclists will wheel to Weston this afternoon, leaving the club rendezvous at 3 o'clock.

At London yesterday Chase rode 60 miles in one hour 46 minutes 38 3/5 seconds, the fastest recorded time for the distance.

A meeting will be held Saturday night in this office for the purpose of organizing the World Bicycle Club.

Forwards will hold a 5-mile sealed handicap this afternoon on Yonge street, leaving Green. Members will wheel out, leaving the club at 2.30.

There was great excitement and enthusiasm at Stratford last evening, when Robert Wells finished his double in 1 hour 40 minutes to 10 and back, 130 odd miles, with 35 minutes to spare from the time allotted for the race.

Finding their present premises on Isabella-street too small, the Toronto Bicycle Club have leased the large, three-story brick house, 21 Alexander-street, and will remove to their new premises the latter part of this month.

A toll-keeper on a road about two miles through the forest of the Ontario C. & N. Railway, without paying toll and demanding a fee of one dollar for the same, has been fined by the court.

The matter will be tested in the courts.

A Provisional Committee of the proposed new Bankers' Bicycle Association has been appointed. Messrs. Bolton of Imperial Bank, McHarris of the Bank of Commerce, Cayley of the Dominion Bank, Crawford of the Bank of Montreal, Hodgson of the Bank of Toronto, and Miller of the Bank of Montreal will elect permanent officers and complete the organization next week.

Vice-President Hurst of the C.W.A. thinks the following rules should be imposed on all riders: Keep to the right, with the speed limited to eight miles per hour. If these two rules were observed there would be no necessity for carrying bells or lamps.

She Killed the Biggest Tiger.

To Mrs. Laurie-Johnston, well known as a hunter of big game, belongs the honor of having killed the biggest tiger ever measured in India.

It was shot by her last month in the Achut Reserved Forest and was found to be 12 feet 1-2 inch long—12 1-2 inches longer than the famous tiger killed on April 19, 1871, by J. L. Shillington.

The measurements of the beast's skin, without undue stretching, were 12 feet 1-2 inch; nose to root of tail, 8 feet 7 inches; skull, 14.37 inches long, and 9 inches wide at the cheek bones, or the zygomatic measurement. The tail was 2 feet 10 inches long, which was 6 inches longer than the average of five other big tigers' tails. The skull weighed 3 pounds 7 ounces, a portion of the lower jaw having been shot away by a heavy bullet.
