## MURDERER RUN DOWN

New York Police Trail Girl's Slayer in Record Time.

One Week After Finding a Bleached Skeleton on Long Island, Detectives Arrest and Secure a Confession From Frederick Gebhardt, Who Admits That He Killed Anna Luther In Order to Rejoin First Wife.

New York, Oct. 26.—A year and a half ago a friendless girl was murdered in a forsaken patch of woodland near Islip, L.I. A week ago her bleached and charred skeleton was found, with nothing to indicate its identity but her jewelry and a bill of sale from a German shop. Three days later, through the police of Hamburg, Germany, her identity was established as Anna Luther, though the cables first carried the name as Lutter. Sunday night her husband, Frederick Gebhardt, was caught in Astoria, L.I., by a photographer's flash-light, and yesterday he confessed over his signature that he is the murderer. Gebhardt married Anna Luther under the name of Otto Mueller. The confession is as follows:

About December, 1907, I first met Anna Luther. We were married in February, 1908, and went to Europe to live. We returned in April, 1908. She went to Henry Wertup's in Newark, N.J., to spend a day or two. On the pretence that I was going to rent an apartment for us to live in, I returned to my wife and home in Astoria.

"I met Anna again on April 8 in Newark and we went to address in 34th street, New York, and then to Jamaica, L.I. We stayed at Jamaica until next day.

"April 9 we went to Bayshore and we walked about, and I showed her some property. I got into an argument with her about some money matters and I turned away and wanted to go back. She followed me up, screaming, and I shot her in the head. I did not look at her and don't remember whether I shot her more than once.

"I want to state that I did not kill Anna Luther for her money, as the newspapers have stated. My original reason for marrying Anna was that I did not care to live with my first wife any longer, but as she, my first wife, had given me a child, my desire to again see my child caused me to want to get rid of Anna Luther and rejoin my first wife and child.

Gebhardt told the police he never thought it "worth while" to go back to bury her. Instead, he wrote letters to her friends in New York and Germany, telling them that Anna was in poor health and had gone to Florida. Then "they quit bothering about her."

Gebhardt, when he was in Germany, bought two German police dogs, and it was by tracing the dogs that the detectives found his home in Astoria.

It was first learned from the Hamburg-American Line that all passengers coming on the steamship America when she docked on April 5, 1908, was handled by the New Jersey Transfer Co. of Hoboken. Friends of the slain girl said she had declared the baggage brought over consisted of three trunks. She also told of the trained police dogs that were purchased by "Mueller" in Belgium.

Through the kindness of the officials of the express company, their books were obtained and the record found that three trunks belonging to an Otto Mueller having been handled by them. These, the entry showed, were kept at the company's office three days and then called for. The clerk in charge, when asked about the dogs, said one of the wagon boys had cared for them. This boy, John O'Boyle, has since become an Irish moulin man and is employed in a laundry near by. He remembered the case because he had been given only 25 cents for the three days' work. He explained that they were delivered to an expressman who lived on Washington street, Hoboken.

Search on this street brought one Christopher Kossow of No. 400 Washington street, to light. He remembered the case because he had been told not to divulge the address in Astoria to which he had delivered the goods. He finally found the house. A visit was made to a nearby saloon and the bartender was asked if he knew where a watchdog could be bought.

"Yes," was the answer. "A man named Gebhardt, down the street, has some he brought back from Germany a year ago last April. He wants to sell one of them."

Gebhardt was arrested on the street. He attempted to escape, but was run down.

**Loans to Stop Emigration.**

Stockholm, Oct. 26.—With a view to stemming the tide of emigration which threatens to deplete the country of agricultural laborers, a national subscription has been started to obtain funds for loans to laborers left unemployed after the recent big strike. The loans are intended to enable the purchase of small farms and will be repayable within ten years. The fund will be administered by the Anti-Emigration Society of Sweden.

## Crown Prince Can't Go Home

Athens, Oct. 26.—Crown Prince Constantine, who has been traveling for the past six weeks, has announced his intention to return here. His presence, however, would be distasteful to the military party and it is said that the King has persuaded him to stay away.

## Smoking Induced Cancer.

Windsor, Oct. 26.—Frederick Mail-lot, a prominent French resident, and real estate dealer, died from cancer of the throat, superinduced, physicians say, by excessive smoking. Blood-poisoning developed and he expired suddenly.

## Children Cry FOR FLETCHER'S CASTORIA

## FOR FIRST GOVERNOR

Herbert Gladstone May Go to South Africa.

Secretary for Home Affairs Is Named as Possible Pro-consul of Empire For the New Commonwealth—John Burns Might Then Take the Home Secretaryship—Is Youngest Son of Grand Old Man.

London, Oct. 26.—Sir Herbert Gladstone will, according to The Daily Telegraph, be the first Governor-General of United South Africa. Mr. Gladstone has not been considered a great success as Secretary for Home Affairs and there have been some hints of his removal to another sphere. There is some doubt, however, whether his appointment as Governor-General would prove acceptable to South Africa, in view of the fact that the name of his father was associated with Majuba Hill.

The removal of Mr. Gladstone would lead to interesting Cabinet changes, possibly to the promotion of John Burns, President of the Local Government Board, to the Home Secretaryship.

Mr. Gladstone has been Secretary for Home Affairs since 1905, and has represented Leeds W. in Parliament since 1880. He was born in Downing street, London, Jan. 7, 1854, the youngest son of the Rt. Hon. W. E. Gladstone, for whom he acted as private secretary 1880-1. Educated at Eton and Oxford, he was history lecturer at Keble College 1877-1880, in which year he contested Middlesex County for Parliament. From 1881-85 he was a Lord of the Treasury; 1885-1892, Under Secretary of Home Office; 1892-5, first commissioner of works. In 1901 he married Dorothy, daughter of Sir Richard Eggar.

## Spain Will Back Up

Madrid, Oct. 26.—Lieut. Gen. De Luque, Minister of War in the new Liberal Cabinet, in an interview yesterday, confirmed the report that the Government had decided not to push further the Moroccan campaign. He said that if the Liberals had been in power before, they would have avoided the bloody and costly war.

From now on the Minister of War said the work of the army would be that of pacification and not of domination. De Luque, added, although the Liberals disapproved the recent acts of repression at Barcelona, Ferret had been proved guilty on evidence and condemned. The Republicans won at yesterday's municipal elections in Madrid.

The Government has made public the documents in the Ferret case in the form of a brochure, which has been sent out broadcast.

## Threw Rings Out Car Window.

San Francisco, Oct. 26.—J. E. Chilberg, president of the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition, is said to have accidentally thrown diamond rings worth several thousand dollars out of the car window while on his way from Portland to the Portola Exhibition last week. The diamonds belonged to Mrs. Chilberg. She had placed them in a glass of water and set them on a window sill. Then she and her husband went to breakfast.

Mr. Chilberg returned to the room first and before closing the window, he threw the water out. When Mrs. Chilberg told him of the contents of the glass, he chartered an engine and directed the search along the railway for the gems. They were not recovered.

## Britain Loses a Velasquez.

London, Oct. 26.—England is deplored the loss of another great masterpiece from a British collection. This is Col. Holroyd's famous Velasquez, portrait of the Duke of Olivares, which figured until recently among the treasures of Dorchester House, tenanted by Ambassador Whitelaw Reid. The picture has been sold by Duxton Brothers to Mrs. Collis P. Huntington. The price is said to be in the neighborhood of \$400,000.

## Holy Ghosts For South America.

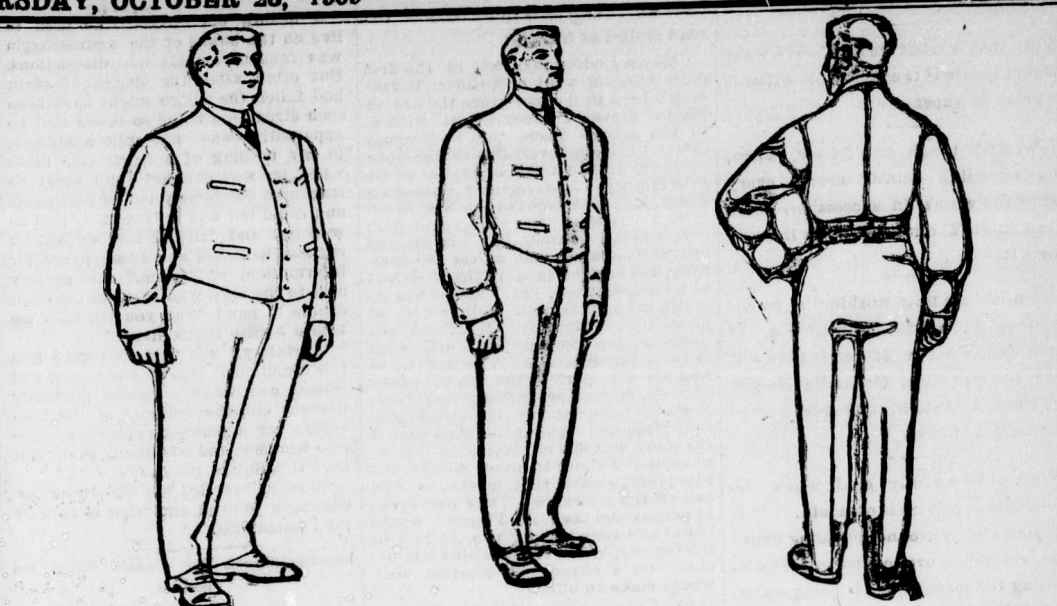
