Skeleton on Long Island, Detectives Arrest and Secure a Confession From Frederick Gebhardt, Who Admits That He Killed Anna Luther In Order to Rejoin First Wife.

Admits That He Killed Anna Lu-ther In Order to Rejoin First Wife. New York, Oct. 26.—A year and a half ago a friendless girl was mur-dered in a forsaken patch of woodland near Islip, L.I. A week ago her bleached and charred skeleton was found, with nothing to indicate its identity but her jewelry and a bill of sale from a German shop. Three days later, through the police of Hamburg, Germany, her identity was established as Anna Luther, though the cables first earried the name as Latter. Sunday night her husband, Frederick Gebhardt, was caught in As-toria, L.I., by a photographer's flash-light, and yesterday he confessed over his signature that he is the murderer. Gebhardt married Anna Luther un-der the name of Otto Mueller. The confession is as follows: "About December, 1907, I first met Anna Luther. We were married in February, 1908, and went to Europe to live. We returned in April, 1908. She went to Henry Wertupp's in Newark, N.J., to spend a day or two. On the pretence that I was going to rent an apartment for us to live in, I return-ed to my wife and home in Astoria. "I met Anna again on April 8 in Newark and we went to address in 34th street. New York, and then to Jamaica, L.I. We stayed at Jamaica until next day. "April 9 we went to Bayshore and we walked about, and I showed her some property. I got into an argu-ment with her about some money matters and I turned away and want-ed to go back. She followed me up, screaming, and I shot her in the head. as Possible Pro-consul of Empire For the New Commonwealth John Burns Might Then Take the Home Secretaryship-Is Yoursgest Son of Grand Old Man.

Grand Old Man. London, Oct. 26.—Rt. Hon. Herbert J. Gladstone will, according to The Daily Telegraph, be the first Gover-mor-General of United South Africa. Mr. Gladstone has not been consid-ered a great success as Secretary for Home Affairs and there have been made hints of his removal to another sphere. There is some doubt, however, whether his appointment as Governor-General would prove acceptable to South Africa, in view of the fact that the name of his father was associat-ed with Majuba Hill. The removal of Mr. Gladstone would lead to interesting Cabinet changes, possibly to the promotion of John Burns, President of the Local Govern-ment Board, to the Home Secretary-ship. Rt. Hon. Mr. Gladstone has been Secretary for Home Affairs since 1905, and has represented Leeds W. in Parliament since 1880. He was born in Downing street, London, Jan. 7, 1854, the youngest son of the Rt. Hon. W. E. Gladstone, for whom he acted as private secretary 1960-1. Educated at Eton and Oxford, he was history lecturer at Keble College 1877-1880, m which year he contested Middlesex County for Parliament. From 1881-he was a Lord of the Treasury; 1886, Financial Secretary of Home Office; 1894.5, first commissioner of works. In 1901 he married Dorothy, daugniter of Sir Richard Paget.
