**Bonar Law Thinks Everyone  
Thankful That Such Is Case.**

London, April 12. The relationship between Gen. Foch and the supreme command at Versailles, Andrew Bonar Law stated today in a speech in the House of Commons yesterday, was that the council was still working out the strategy of the war, and that Gen. Foch had been chairman of the council, had of necessity been taken for granted by the council, and was not exactly as already stated by the premier. He had been appointed with the rank of marshal of France, and generals to direct the strategy of the armies.

Mr. Bonar Law said that did not mean the generalissimo was in a different position regarding the British army, and that the British army was not from what he was regarding the French army. What had been decided was that the British army was to be under the command of Gen. Foch was exercising the power of general-in-chief, and he was directing the army. He said that he thought there was no man, either in or outside the House who was not thankful that the war was over, and that the result would be that there would be closer co-ordination than had been possible.

London, April 12.—Gen. Sandeman Carey, who, in the words of Premier Lloyd George, "accomplished one of the most brilliant feats in the history of the British army by holding the gap between the 3rd and the 5th armies in the first days of the German blow in April," and with a hastily organized nondescript force, is a member of one of the best-known families in Guernsey, and is a son of Rev.
