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LEAVE GOVT. RETREATS TO NEW CAPITAL

Petrograd Is Reported Being
Evacuated by Ministry
and Populace.

London, March 6.—The evacuation of Petrograd has begun. Three state ministries, according to a Reuters dispatch from Petrograd, left Thursday, having started to leave the capital, from which the population is fleeing in haste.

The Bolshevik Government proposes to declare Moscow the Russian capital, and Petrograd a free port.

KRYLENKO PROTESTS.
His London, March 6.—The Russian statement received here today says Ensign Krylenko, the Bolshevik commander-in-chief, has sent a message to the German and Austrian commanders, stating that the Germans and Austrians are still fighting, notwithstanding the conclusion of peace. Ensign Krylenko asks whether the German high command has taken all steps necessary for cessation of hostilities.

NO U.S.-JAPAN SIBERIAN PACT

Washington Says All Negotiations Will Go Through the British.

Washington, March 6.—It was authoritatively stated today that the United States has sent no communication to Japan on the subject of a proposed pact between the two nations, and that if any views of the American Government are expressed they will be conveyed to Great Britain through which the United States has received all its information of the situation.

As Japan's special ally, Great Britain is represented as having confidence in Japan's intentions and has sought to impart that confidence to the United States with a view to securing co-operation in a Siberian campaign, but simply to allow any feeling of apprehension that Japan intends to extend her sovereignty over Siberia permanently.

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DEATH CLAIMS JOHN REDMOND, IRISH LEADER

Great Chief of Nationalist
Party Dies in London
Hospital

London, March 6.—John E. Redmond, the Irish Nationalist leader, died this morning.

Mr. Redmond, who underwent an operation in London last Friday, passed a fair day yesterday and apparently was maintaining the progress shown Monday.

Mr. Redmond passed away peacefully at 7:45 o'clock this morning. Death was due to heart failure, following the operation.

The recent operation was for an intestinal obstruction. This was caused by the creation of the Irish parliament, the Sinn Féin revolution, and the rebellion, but attributing it to German plotting in the United States.

When the rebellion had been put down he used all the eloquence of which he was capable in pleading for the rebels, and in urging a speedy settlement of the differences that had caused the revolution.

With the entrance of England into the war, Redmond immediately defined the position of the Irish Nationalist party. His support of the Government in the war, and his open and bitter condemnation of the Sinn Féin party, members of which at public meetings accused him of being a traitor to the Irish cause.

He maintained his loyal position even during the exciting days of the Sinn Féin revolution, and to German plotting in the United States.

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CANADIAN LINER CALGARIAN SUNK BY GERMAN U-BOATS; 500 OF 610 ABOARD SAFE

Two Officers and 46 Men Lost by Torpedoing of British
Merchant Cruiser Calgarian on March 1—Carried
Canadian Troops to England Last April.

Belfast, Ireland, March 2.—The British liner Calgarian has been torpedoed off the Irish coast.

There were 610 persons aboard, nearly 500 of whom have been landed at an Irish port. The Calgarian was struck by four torpedoes.

The official announcement was made by the Admiralty today that the British armed merchant cruiser Calgarian was torpedoed and sunk on March 1. Two officers and 46 men were lost.

The Calgarian was the Canadian Allan liner.

ON CRUISER DUTY.
Montreal, March 6.—The S.S. Calgarian, sunk off the Irish coast, has been on cruiser duty in the North Atlantic steamship route since the war broke out. She has also made several trips from Halifax to England with distinguished passengers, on one occasion carrying Sir Robert Borden.

The Calgarian's navigating officer was Captain Kendall, who has been in the service of the British Government. The last report given out concerning the liner was in April of 1916, when she sailed from Halifax for England with Canadian troops.

A most unusual circumstance in connection with the sinking of the Calgarian is the fact that she was struck by four torpedoes. The published reports have shown, in no previous case has a merchantman been subjected to such a heavy attack by submarines. Evidently the Germans concentrated U-boats to insure the sinking of the liner.

NEAR TUSCANIA'S GRAVE.
An Irish Port, Monday, March 4.—The people of this town, who a few days ago won the gratitude of the American people by the kindness of the survivors from the Calgarian, have extended their hospitality in the last few days to many 500 men from the Calgarian, one of the finest auxiliary cruisers in the Atlantic service.
