WOMEN OF LONDON ARE INTERESTED IN **EXPANSION DRIVE**

Officers of Several Organizations Meet With Director.

BE ON BOARD

Resolution Passed To Have Clubs Represented on Trade Board.

Women of London are taking an active interest in the expansion and reorganization campaign of the board of trade. Certain it is that no community movement of the character that has been undertaken here can have its fullest success unless it has the active assistance of the thinking women."

Women as Directors.

In speaking of the work of women in the various boards of trade of this country and the United States, Mr. Foster quoted specific instances.

In Port Huron, Mich., a woman is serving as vice-president on the board of directors. She is in the insurance business. Port Huron is a city of about 20,000 and has an active civic-commercial organization of more than 900 members.

In Riverside, Cal., there is a woman on the board of directors. In Bethlehem. Pa., the wife of a superintendent in one of the steel mills was captain of a membership team and brought into the organization 176 members, leading by a good margin the other 20 teams. The Niagara Falls (N.Y.) Chamber of Commerce has more than 100 women members. In Bangor, Me., each of the clubs which form the local federation of women's clubs sends its president to the chamber of commerce as a member.

The first member enrolled in the Flint (Mich.) Chamber of Commerce when it was reorganized was a woman. When she was asked to fill the line on the card indicating her business, she wrote, "Being the mother of four boys." "But I am not too busy to be interested in the welfare of this city," she added.

In the Fall River (Mass.) reorganization campaign a few weeks ago two teams were captained by women. These teams showed an efficiency considerably above the average.

Mr. Foster closed with an expression of hope that a large number of the women of London will be enrolled as members of the new board of trade. After several of the women had voiced their approval of the board's plans, it was the unanimous decision that all the clubs of women have one or more members in the new organization.




