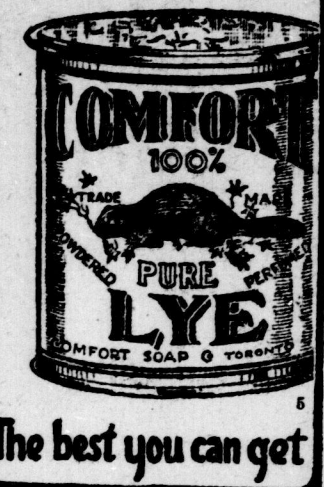

GARDEN ASSN. HAS MADE FINE PROGRESS DURING LAST YEAR

Prizes Awarded To Those Who Made Best Showing.

GOOD WORK OF GIRLS

Reports of the Officials Most Encouraging—Executive Elevated.

Election of officers for the coming year, presentation of the most encouraging reports, and also the presentation of prizes to the women and children members of the association whose gardens made the best showing in the year's competition, constituted the interesting features of the second annual meeting of the Women's Garden Association, held at the Trades House, London, yesterday afternoon. In the absence of Miss Carling, the president and founder of the Women's Garden Association, Mrs. George S. Gibbons, president, Mrs. Gibbons, by the way, being elected the office of president to succeed Miss Carling.

Praise From President. In her presidential address, which was read by Mrs. Gibbons, Miss Carling reviewed the work accomplished by the association, the first of the kind to be organized in Canada.

"Perhaps," said the address, "if war production had not been so necessary, we should not have been so busy with the war. Still, we have given women and girls a push in the right direction, and hope that war or no war, they may never depart from the good habits they have acquired."

Girls' Good Work. Special mention was made of the work of the school girls. About 100 school girls between the ages of 8 and 15 have been working in the gardens since last summer. Last year there were only one school girls' garden, and this year there have been several more. The school is taken over entirely by the association. Last year there were only six community gardens; this year there have been fourteen. One of the gardens was entirely by soldiers' wives. More gardens for the soldiers' wives were recommended, owing to the benevolent work that has been provided for the soldiers, who may be sent to look after a large plot of ground.

LONDON SOLDIER IS HELD AT TOLEDO, O.

Returned Man Charged With Seditious Statements.

WINDSOR, Oct. 10.—A telegram from Toledo, Ohio, this afternoon brought news of the arrest in that city of Lawrence Lazarus, 28 years old, a returned soldier. It is alleged that Lazarus, while under the influence of liquor, made certain statements concerning the government of the United States and Great Britain which are construed as seditious. He is held on \$5,000 bail.

Lazarus' home is said to be in London, where his parents still reside. He enlisted with the 70th Battalion in that city, and served overseas for a time, being returned home with wounds. He has been employed by the street railway company in this city, and the local branch of the Great War Veterans' organization is making efforts to secure his release.

PTE. CLIFFORD BISSELL IS SERIOUSLY WOUNDED

Word was received today by Mrs. Josephine Bissell, 21 James street, that her husband, Pte. Clifford Bissell, is seriously ill at the Canadian hospital station at Lettport from wounds in arms, leg and chest. He was admitted to the hospital on October 6. Pte. Bissell went overseas with the C. M. R. When he was employed with the Canadian Engineers & Co., as a Jeweller engraver.

LIEUTENANT FOX OF FIRST CONTINGENT KILLED IN ACTION

William Fox, 793 Nelson street, received word Wednesday that his son, Lieut. William Harold Fox, was officially reported killed in action on October 1. Lieut. Fox was reported on Tuesday to be missing, and believed wounded, but the further message received on Wednesday states that he was killed. He left this city with the contingent under Col. Campbell Becher, and after spending many months in France was wounded, and later was awarded a commission. He is well known about this city, and had a large circle of friends. He was born and raised here, attending the public schools and collegiate institute. He was 25 years of age. His parents, one brother, Robert B., and one sister, Mrs. Harper, all of this city, survive.

REQUIRED.—Would you kindly inform us what the present law is regarding a man dying without a will, and his widow having no family, how is the property to be divided? Ans.—Not value of estate not exceeding \$1,000, half absolutely; excess over \$1,000, half to wife, and half to next of kin, in equal degrees to intestate, or their legal representatives, or, if no next of kin, to the crown.

Robert Redfern, of the infantry, had been officially reported killed in action on Sept. 27. Pte. Redfern went overseas with the 151st. Alex. McLean received a cable also, stating that his son, Acting Corporal Berrie McLean, had been killed in action on Sept. 28. He was another of the 151st boys.

CADET MOORHEAD ILL. Alderman C. G. Moorhead has received word that his son, Cadet Edwin G. Moorhead, in training in the R.A.F., Toronto, has been admitted to the hospital there, having contracted pneumonia.
