DR. FLANDERS FOUND DEAD IN BED AT HOME

Former London Minister Victim of Stroke of Apoplexy.

POPULAR WHILE HERE

Instrumental in Raising \$40,-000 Church Debt in the Western City.

Methodists of the city heard this this morning with deep regret the news of the death of Rev. Dr. Charles R. Flanders, who for four years, 1913 to 1917, was pastor of the First Methodist Church here, at his home in Winnipeg. Dr. Flanders was found dead in his bed on Tuesday morning, death having been caused by an attack of apoplexy. and the first news of the sad event reached the city in a message to his daughter, Mrs. F. M. Brickenden, Huron

The late Dr. Flanders was born in the Eastern Townships, Quebec, where he was educated in the public schools, later going to Victoria Unive sity. He was in his 69th year, 49 of which he served in the Methodist Church, his first charge being in the Kingston district. Later he was appointed lecturer in the Methodist College at Montreal, from which place he went to the Stanstead Wesleyan College at Stanstead, Quebec, as principal, a position which he held for twenty years.

Resigning the position he took a pastorate at St. John, N. B., which he held for four years, leaving in 1912 to take charge of First Methodist Church. London, going from here in 1917 to accept the pastorate of the Broadway Methodist Church, Winnipeg.

During his pastorate here Dr. Flanders took great interest in educational affairs, and was for two years a member of the public library board. He was a preacher of great force, and endeared himself to his congregation. The same forceful personality made itself felt in his pastorate in Winnipeg, during the period of which a debt of \$40,000 on the church was wiped out. At the time of his death he was president of the Ministerial Association of Winnipeg.

He is survived by his wife, two sons, John A. and Sidney of Winnipeg, and four daughters, Mrs. F. M. Erleken en of London, and Misses Marjorie, Ecattrice and Elizabeth of Winnipeg,
