

DR. FLANDERS FOUND DEAD IN BED AT HOME IN WINNIPEG
Former London Minister Victim of Stroke of Apoplexy.
POPULAR WHILE HERE
Instrumental in Raising \$40,000 Church Debt in the Western City.

Methodists of the city heard this morning with deep regret the news of the death of Rev. Dr. Charles R. Flanders, who for four years, 1913 to 1917, was pastor of the First Methodist Church here, at his home in Winnipeg. Dr. Flanders was found dead in his bed on Tuesday morning, death having been caused by an attack of apoplexy, and the first news of the sad event reached the city in a message to his daughter, Mrs. F. M. Brickenden, Huron street.

The late Dr. Flanders was born in the Eastern Townships, Quebec, where he was educated in the public schools, later going to Victoria University. He was in his 69th year, 49 of which he served in the Methodist Church, his first charge being in the Kingston district. Later he was appointed lecturer in the Methodist College, Montreal, from which place he went to the St. Lawrence Wesleyan College at Stanstead, Quebec, as principal, a position which he held for twenty years.

Resigning the position, he took a pastorate at St. John's, N. B., which he held for four years, leaving in 1912 to take charge of First Methodist Church, London, going from here in 1917 to accept the pastorate of the Broadway Methodist Church, Winnipeg.

During his pastorate here Dr. Flanders took great interest in educational affairs, and was for two years a member of the public library board. He was a preacher of great force, and endeavored himself to his congregation during the period of which a sum of \$40,000 for the church was raised out of the time of his death he was president of the Ministerial Association of Winnipeg.

He is survived by his wife, two sons, John A. and Sidney of Winnipeg, and two daughters, Mrs. E. M. Brickenden of London, and Misses Marie, Beatrice and Elizabeth of Winnipeg.

A double funeral service will be held at the Broadway Methodist Church, Winnipeg, today, after which the remains were sent to Stanstead, Que., where the interment will take place.

STRONG OPPOSITION TO MEASURED PLAN OF BELL TELEPHONE
Manufacturers' Association Will Fight Proposed System to the Limit.

HEARING IN MONTREAL

Great Array of Legal Talent to Support Company's Claims.

Montreal, Nov. 10.—Emphatic objection to the installation of the measured service system proposed by the Bell Telephone Company was made in a brief filed on behalf of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association with the board of railway commissioners when it met here this morning, under the chairmanship of Hon. F. B. Carvell. Briefs along similar lines were presented by the board of trade, the chamber of commerce, the Montreal Publicity Association and other interested local bodies. The Union of Canadian Municipalities has instructed Charles Laurendeau, K.C., to watch the proceedings on its behalf. The company was represented by a battery of legal and technical experts.

PENROSE PREPARING TO RETURN TO U. S. SENATE

Philadelphia, Nov. 10.—Published reports are that United States Senator Boies Penrose, who has been ill for a year, has had a relapse. Besides his other ailments, the senator is suffering from neuritis, which at times gives him much pain. The fact that he is not seeing visitors at this time is believed to be due to the severity of his condition.

Senator Penrose is making preparations to return to the Senate after an absence since last November. He has leased a large apartment in Washington.

STARVATION FACING THOUSANDS OF CHILDREN IN CENTRAL EUROPE
Urgent Appeal Made for Assistance to Chamber of Commerce Directors—London's Quota Is \$6,000.

So great is the need of relief for the starving children of Central Europe that help is only being given by relief agencies to those who are actually starving. Mrs. Harris stated in a brief but graphically impressive appeal on behalf of the British Red Cross, war relief fund, at the directors' luncheon of the London Chamber of Commerce today.

The directors present intimated that they would be glad to take whatever steps might be deemed most advisable to help what was obviously a crying need and a worthy cause. George H. Barker, who presided, suggested possibly a letter might be sent out by the Chamber of Commerce presenting the claims of the British Red Cross to all members of the legal and business community, and to others.

W. R. Yendall asked whether it would be possible to divert part of the funds of the Canadian Red Cross to the aid of the children of Europe, but Mrs. Harris pointed out that that would scarcely be legal and besides the money is being used to continue work among the Canadian soldiers.

Secretary Gordon Philip in answer to questions of members of the directors, stated that he had been informed that the work of the British Red Cross did not overlap with the work of the Brotherhood movement for the education and relief of Serbian children.

Other members of the deputation which waited upon the Chamber of Commerce directors were Mrs. John Slater and Mrs. E. C. Bowker.

In asking for the co-operation of the Chamber of Commerce, Mrs. Harris said that Herbert Hoover was authority for the urgent need of money for the fund, and that the money was being used to the greatest possible advantage and in the most careful manner.

Miss Winter, a British Red Cross representative, who has recently concluded a tour of Central Europe, spoke in London last Thursday, and dramatically impressed her hearers with the urgency of the situation.

Mrs. Bowker declared that if the starving children of Central Europe were not assisted those who survived starvation would grow up with wrong ideas as to the world they live in. She would become a menace to the whole world if they developed into a generation of criminals.

Mrs. Harris, when asked how much London's objective for the British Red Cross relief fund was, replied that it was hoped to secure an average per capita contribution of two cents, or \$5,000 or \$6,000 in all.

COAL MERCHANTS MUST GET WORD OF CUSTOMERS
Ontario Fuel Controller Issues a New Order.

DECLARATION NECESSARY

Mayor of Each Municipality Will Be Notified.

Toronto, Nov. 10.—The Ontario fuel controller is issuing special instructions to all dealers that in filling further orders they must first secure from the consumer a declaration that he has not on hand sufficient coal to last him through the winter. The order will go to all dealers and the mayor of each municipality.

Information is also being gathered by the fuel controller so that wherever emergencies arise immediate steps may be taken to relieve the situation.

Galicians May Join British Empire Soon

Thousands Returning From Canada To Vote On Question.

Winnipeg, Nov. 9.—Twenty thousand Galicians will return home this winter from Western Canada, steamship accommodation across the Atlantic now being arranged by Winnipeg agents of transatlantic lines. Many of them will never return to Canada. This announcement was made by Calder & Son, steamship agents.

Galician leaders here claim that the people of Galicia are dissatisfied with their present position, and intend to vote shortly as to whether they will join the British Empire. Many are going home to get there in time to take part in the voting.

COL. GAULT'S FIANCEE KILLED IN ACCIDENT

Motor Overtakes, Causing the Death of Mrs. Blackader.

London, Nov. 10.—(Canadian Press).—Mrs. Kathleen Blackader, who was shortly to marry Col. Hamilton Gault, former aide of the Princess Patricia's Battalion, was killed while motoring yesterday with Col. Gault in the motor car which they were driving. The automobile skidded and overturned. Col. Gault was not injured.

It is rumored that he will not retire from municipal life entirely, but will be elected to the council, possibly the board of education.

The board is not operated on a full-time basis, and the fact that South London has only two trustees, Thomas Rowe and John Langford, is evidence of this. DEAD WOMAN WAS WIDOW OF OFFICER OF CANADIAN UNIT

Montreal, Nov. 10.—Mrs. Blackader was the widow of Capt. Gordon Blackader, late of the 42nd Battalion, Royal Highlanders of Canada, who was killed in action in June, 1916. Col. Hamilton Gault was divorced from his wife, who was Miss Margaret Claire Stephens of Montreal, in 1914. The divorce was granted on the ground that she was insane. A cablegram has been received by Dr. D. Blackader of 236 Mount Pleasant, Montreal, in Paris, last year.

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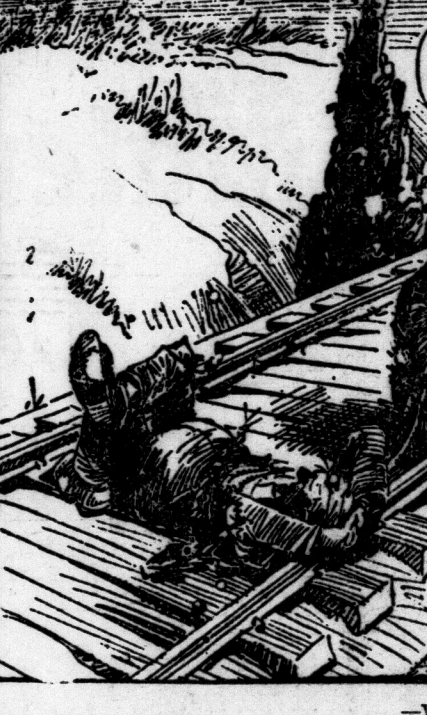
PARISH HOME IS DYNAMITED, BUT NO ONE INJURED

48 LOSE LIVES WHEN TYPHOON HITS SHIP

Manila, Nov. 10.—Forty-eight persons are believed to have perished when the coastwise steamer San Basilio was struck by a typhoon last Wednesday en route to Puerto Bello, Leyte Island, South Philippines, according to a survivor reaching here. Fifteen survivors reached Cebu. There were 64 people aboard the vessel.

ITALY'S DEMANDS ARE PRESENTED TO JUGO-SLAVS

Conditions Submitted Call for Fiume's Independence.

MINIMUM CLAIMS

Terms Are Regarded Excessive by the Jugo-Slav Delegates.

Rapallo, Italy, Nov. 10.—In what may be considered an ultimatum sent to the Jugo-Slav delegates regarding the pending negotiations between Italy and Jugo-Slavia over the Adriatic question, Count Storza, the Italian foreign minister, as head of the Italian delegation, laid down Italy's definite minimum claims. These, the document stated, were:

First, the Italian frontier, including the Julian Alps, Nevaio, and the railway from Fiume to St. Peter Junction.

Second, territorial continuity between Fiume and Italy.

Third, Fiume to be a state entirely independent without any control by the League of Nations.

Fourth, annexation of the islands of Lido-Piccolo and Cherso to Italy.

Fifth, the annexation of Sars to Italy.

Sixth, the annexation of several of the Jugo-Slav islands to Italy for strategic reasons.

Seventh, guarantees for the protection of the Italian minorities in Dalmatia remaining under Serbian rule.

Eighth, demilitarization of some of the Dalmatian positions which will be allotted to Serbia.

It is stated the Italian minimum terms were presented on the request of the Jugo-Slav delegation, the Jugo-Slavs were said to consider the Italian terms excessive, but they reserved their reply until the claims had been further examined.

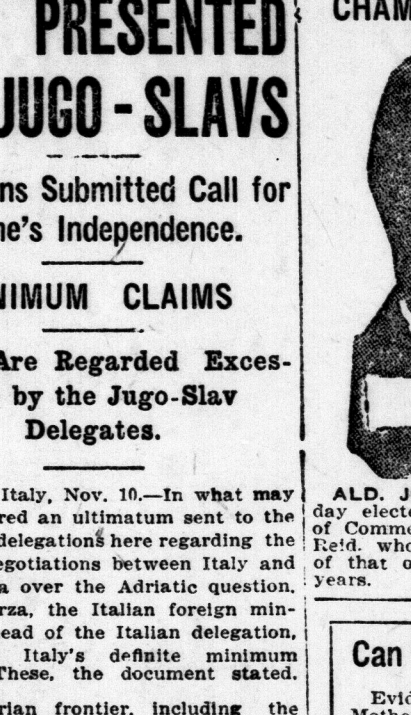

Increased Home Production To Solve Problem

German Minister Urges This Method Upon Fellow-Countrymen.

Berlin, Nov. 10.—Hope for the betterment of Germany's food situation through increased home production and improvement in the method of handling the foodstuffs was expressed by Andreas Hermes, the minister of food, in a statement to the main committee of the Reichstag today. The grain deliveries from inland sources were lagging behind, the minister said, and he proposed to accelerate them by demanding the close co-operation of the federated states and the producers. The threat of rigorous penalties for illicit trafficking in wheat and flour also was held out by the minister.

Case Comes Before Welland Magistrate After Five Crown Enlargements.

Welland, Nov. 10.—After five crown enlargements, eighteen persons, all residents of Thorold and district, appeared before Magistrate Frazer of Niagara Falls, at Welland this afternoon, charged with being members of an unlawful assembly on August 16, when David McNeil was almost lynched by a mob of about 100 persons, and the murder of 4-year-old Margaret Boucock, but who was afterwards acquitted by a competent jury.

The case recalls the awful night of terror, when for seven hours mob law held sway, reaching its climax when the town hall was fired.

Magistrate Frazer, who has charge of the case, will not try the accused, but will hold a preliminary hearing and commit them. Mr. Jeffries of Oriskany is acting crown counsel, while H. A. Rose of Welland, A. Brooks, Welland, and F. W. Griffiths of Niagara Falls are acting for the defence. The accused are Bert Bauman, Merritt; Murray Brady, Thorold Township; Thomas McNeill, Thorold Township; David White, St. Catharines; Edward Hacking, St. Catharines; Fred Cowell, Barrie; Cecil Dale, Hackett; David Jackson, William Jackson, Owen Wright, Cecil Young, Walter Johnstone, George Atkins, all of Thorold. Charles Atkins is an ex-deputy reeve of the town of Thorold.

CLAIMS THAT HE WAS SWINDLED OF \$4,000

New Brunswick Man Relates Story to Montreal Judge.

Montreal, Nov. 10.—Joseph Andre, of Minto Mines, N. B., related to Judge Cusson yesterday how he had been swindled out of \$4,000 by a "con" man on October 26 in this city. He charged Emil Roy and Victor Bohan with telling him to sue here. Roy threw a fifty dollar bill on the table and Andre told him to be careful as there were thieves around. Roy then stood, insisted on giving him the fifty dollars for his warning, and refused to return it. He claims the two men had a parcel containing two cigars rolled up in a couple of newspapers.

Roy told the court he would swear "on the coffin of his father" that Andre was not telling the truth. Andre related that he would swear "on the head of his wife and two children" that he was a mafioso, brigand and thief.

Judge Cusson committed the two accused for trial, refusing bail.

Clifton, Nov. 10.—A strike of 100 men, demanding higher wages to meet the high cost of living has been proclaimed by the men of the Spanish State Employees.

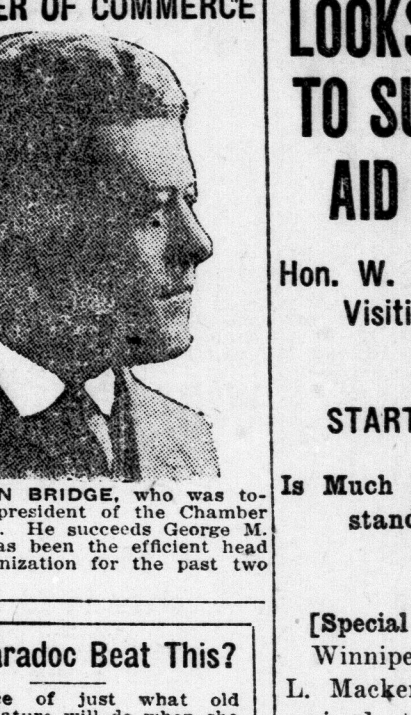
U. S. FARMERS PLAN COMBINE TO FIX PRICES OF THEIR PRODUCTS

Nation-Wide Selling Organizations Will Be Established Unless Government Discontinues Practice of Importing Raw Materials Free of Duty.

Bozeman, Nov. 10.—The establishment of nation-wide selling organizations which shall fix the price of farm products, if the farmer does not receive the same pay for the same amount of work that he receives today, was predicted today by Sherman L. Lowell of Fredonia, N. Y., master of the National Grange of the Patrons of Husbandry, in opening the annual convention of the Grange.

"We are willing to have a fair understanding of values," he said, "the farmers receiving the same pay for the same amount of work that others receive, no more, no less, but we feel that this is the last call. If no attention is paid to this now by bankers, manufacturers, railroads and labor organizations, and if the government continues to use its great power to import raw materials free of duty to reduce costs, then the Grange will be the first to help organize nation-wide selling organizations which shall fix the price of farm products."

Washington, Nov. 10.—The Gracoco-Roman baths of the United States Senate, installed nearly eight years ago, are never put into service, are now being cleared of the cobwebs and stains of time, and will be in shape to offer their luxuries of steam, plunge, shower and electricity to the members of the new Senate when it assembles.
