LOST IN DENSE FOREST WANDERED THREE DAYS

Mrs. Arthur Moore of Falkenburg Has Terrible Experience—Awakened by Wild Animals.

MUSKOKA, Sept. 7.—(Special.)—The Herald says: It falls to the lot of very few women in the twentieth century in this quiet country of ours to go thru the thrilling yet terrible experience just suffered by Mrs. Arthur Moore of Falkenburg. And it is doubtful if many women could have lived in such circumstances, or, at any rate, have had the endurance and common-sense displayed by Mrs. Moore. To be alone in a thickly-wooded forest with the hopeless feeling of being lost, not only for an hour or a day but in the blackness of the night, with all its mysterious noises, real and imaginary; then, after wandering all day in vain endeavors to find the way out, to spend yet another night and part of the next day in the same maze.

Between 10 and 11 o'clock Sunday morning, Mrs. Moore went out for a walk, and followed a path which she thought led to an old crabapple orchard some distance behind her husband's place. She did not come to the orchard, and turned back to what she thought was the way home. There were a number of trails in the bush, and she in some way got astray and farther from home. She called, but no one heard her; her progress was very slow for the forest at this point is very

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THE DOG SHOW OPENS.

Largest Exhibit Ever—700 Canines Are Shown.

The dog show opened yesterday, and with 700 canines occupying the stalls and yelping vigorous protest against imprisonment, there was even more pandemonium than usual. For the number of dogs on exhibit is away ahead of the record of any previous year, and the volume of noise was great in proportion, owing to an excellent index of the location of the building to sightseers within quite a wide radius.

Protection of Public Water Supplies and the Public Health. There is increasing difficulty in finding pure water supplies for our cities and towns.
