MEASURE TO IMPLEMENT AGREEMENTS BETWEEN CANADA AND CERTAIN COUNTRIES TO AVOID DOUBLE TAXATION

The House resumed consideration of Bill C-12, to implement an agreement between Canada and the Federal Republic of Germany and conventions between Canada and Morocco, Canada and Pakistan, Canada and Singapore, Canada and the Philippines, Canada and the Dominican Republic and Canada and Switzerland for the avoidance of double taxation with respect to income tax, as reported (without amendment) from the Standing Committee on Finance, Trade and Economic Affairs.
