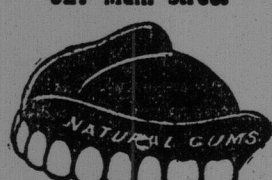

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A WAY TO ECONOMIZE

It is suggested that Offices of Harbor Master, Collector of Harbor Revenues and Supt. of Ferries Should be Amalgamated.

Now the water rates are increasing and there is a probability of heavy expenditures in other branches of civic work it is suggested that a move might be made toward retrenchment by the amalgamation of the offices of harbor master, collector of harbor revenues and superintendent of ferries, or at least of two of these offices. If such action were taken it would mean a saving to the city of from \$600 to \$1,500 and it is believed the work would be done as efficiently as in the past.

The government steamer Lady Louisa is at present engaged placing an automatic mine at a point off the coast of St. John's. This aid to navigation will be welcomed by the shipping entering Sydney harbor—Sydney Post.

NOVA SCOTIA EXHIBITION.

A copy of the prize list of the Nova Scotia Provincial Exhibition for 1908, has been received. The dates are September 2 to 10, at Halifax.
