## MORE ABOUT THE DOUBLE TRACKING OF UNION ST.

(Continued from page 1.)

We now request that, in view of its great importance, and of the fact that no chance was given to the business men and residents and teamsters interested in the matter, to lay their side of the case before you, the question be again opened.

Taking into consideration the statements which we have just made, we feel assured that the petitioners should be given a hearing, the matter fairly and equitably considered.

We are advised that, because of a petition against it, you refused to allow Union street to be double-tracked between Sydney and Charlotte streets. Our clients were never given a chance to make a petition. Have they not the same rights as the residents and business men between Sydney and Charlotte streets, and the traffic over it is just as heavy. All the reasons that are given for not double-tracking Union street between Sydney and Brussels streets, a double track, this short distance, will not at all inconvenience the travelling public, while, on the other hand, a double track will work serious injury to those who signed the two petitions which were last filed with your board of works, in the following manner:

It will greatly decrease the value of property fronting on said portion of Union street; it will cause great inconvenience to those residing along this portion of Union street; it will greatly inconvenience and seriously hamper those doing business thereon, causing great delay in the delivery of goods both to and from their premises; it being the chief thoroughfare of the city of St. John for all traffic incidental to that part of the city, and also one of the main arteries for trade with the surrounding country, it will render unsafe the passage of teams and endanger the lives of pedestrians.

Talking with the Times, Thomas F. White, manager of the White Candy Company, Ltd. stated that at the council meeting referred to he waited—not out in the afternoon, but in the council chamber—for two hours, from 4.30 o'clock in the afternoon, until 6.30 o'clock in the evening. It could not be said, he added, that there was no delegation present, as Alderman Pickett drew attention to the matter two or three times, and yet the matter said he didn't see them.

Another interested party who happened to be present asked Mr. White, if, even at this late hour, when the door had been taken down and the horse gone, it were not possible for someone to put up the door again and get him back.

Mr. White then went on to point out that letters from the residents of Union street as well as the delegation were ignored by the council. The matter, he adds, has ceased to concern only the White Candy Company, Ltd. and those doing business on Union street, but has become a question of public interest generally and many are wondering what the council intend to do to this time.

When the letters were written and laid before the council by the residents of Union street and the other petitioners, it was thought that the common council had dealt with the matter and nobody dreamed that the board of works would act without authority from the common council.

Another interested party in speaking with the Times said: "The common council having refused to grant a permit to double track Union street, the board of works put it through without consulting the council. Now, when can the citizens rely on an agreement with the city council when such conditions exist?"

The same person adds that the question to be decided is whether the board of works or the common council is running the city and will be decided in the vote on the double-track matter at the next meeting. This, he points out, is the first time the board of works has acted in such a manner with regard to double-tracking, and if they do it with that it is reasonable to assume that they might also do it with other people to have special privileges in the harbor. The double-tracking of Union street will, he states, further increase the city's liability as it is the council and not the street railway company who must meet any damages resulting therefrom. "Well, the taxpayers of St. John," he concludes, "allow this to go on?"

Meanwhile the work of double tracking Union street is going merrily on. The tracks have been laid and the paving of the street is almost completed.

## HOTEL GUESTS ESCAPED CLAD IN NIGHT ROBES

Fire in Plaza Hotel Early This Morning Causes a Panic—Exhausted Women Picked Off Fire Escapes.

CHICAGO, Nov. 2.—More than five hundred guests of the Plaza Hotel, North Avenue and Clark street, fled from their rooms early today when fire broke out in the basement of the hotel. The building was quickly filled with smoke and many of the guests had difficulty in reaching the street. The guests, most of them thinly clad, sought refuge in stores nearby. Some of them were slightly affected by the smoke. About 40 women becoming exhausted, were carried down ladders and fire escapes by firemen. Arthur Hart, the night clerk and two bell boys who nearly lost their lives in wearing the guests of their danger, assisted many in reaching the street. When the firemen reached the building the fire escapes were crowded with frightened men and women. Some of them jumped from the second floor landings without waiting to be taken down. Several were severely bruised. The fire was soon extinguished with small property loss.

## THEY CANT TRIM KING

Japanese in Vancouver Find the Commissioner a Difficult Problem.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Nov. 2.—(Special) Mr. Ogawa, secretary of the Kanago Company, an employment agency, who on Thursday was instructed to produce the company's books failed to do this yesterday.

Commissioner King said he hoped he would not be obliged to send a policeman after Ogawa. He pointed out that it was very desirable in the interests of Ogawa and his firm, that the promises to produce the books be carried out. He hoped, for the sake of the parties interested that these employment agencies were not surrounded by more mystery than was necessary.

"I want to have a look at those damaged goods," remarked the commissioner to Mr. Tanaka, a tailor who presented a claim for \$675. Tanaka stated in his declaration that the goods were spoiled by stones thrown through his windows.

"I cannot see how you lost so much on this cloth," continued the commissioner. "There is a doubt in my mind and I think I will go down and look at the goods, will you take me down?"

"Oh, I don't think it's any use going down, besides, I am busy this evening," replied Tanaka.

"I will go right away," said the commissioner, "now do you want me to go?"

"But I have not had anything to eat," protested the witness, "and I have business to attend to."

"Well," said the commissioner, "if you have time to show me the damage done I have none to consider your statement. I am prepared to go with you to look at the damage, and make my own estimate. Do you want me to go?"

"Oh go if you like," said the witness.

"That's not answering my question," objected the commissioner, "take your choice."

"All right," conceded Tanaka, "any time you like to come," and the little party embarked for Westminster.
