DeedsWhichWon Second Bar To Major C.W. McLean's D.S.O.

London, July 19-The official Gazzette last night announced awards of military decorations to several Canadians. Among the honors is the award of the second bar to the D. S. O. to Major Charles Wesley Weldon McLean, son of Brig.-Gen. H. H. McLean, M. P. forQueens-Sunbury (N. B.) There are over a dozen awards of the Distinguished Service Order and several military crosses. while a number get a bar to the military cross.

Twice the same day Major McLean went forward at great personal risk into a heavy barrage fire to reconnoiter. The following day he led a party under heavy shell fire to extinguish a fire which threatened to cause grave casualties, and succeeded in saving guns and munitions.

Eleven V. C's Won by Canadians. Eleven members of the Canadian force have now won the Victoria Cross during the present war. The names and ranks at the time of the awards are: Captain F. A. C. Scrimger, A. M. C.; Color-Sergeant F. W. Hall, 8th Battalion (killed); Lance-Corporal F. Fisher, 13th Battalion (killed); V. C's all awarded in June, 1915. Lieutenant (util the state in August, 1915; Private (acting corporal) L. Clarke, infantry; Private J. C. Kerr, infantry, awards made in October, 1916. Captain T. W. MacDowell, D. S. 
