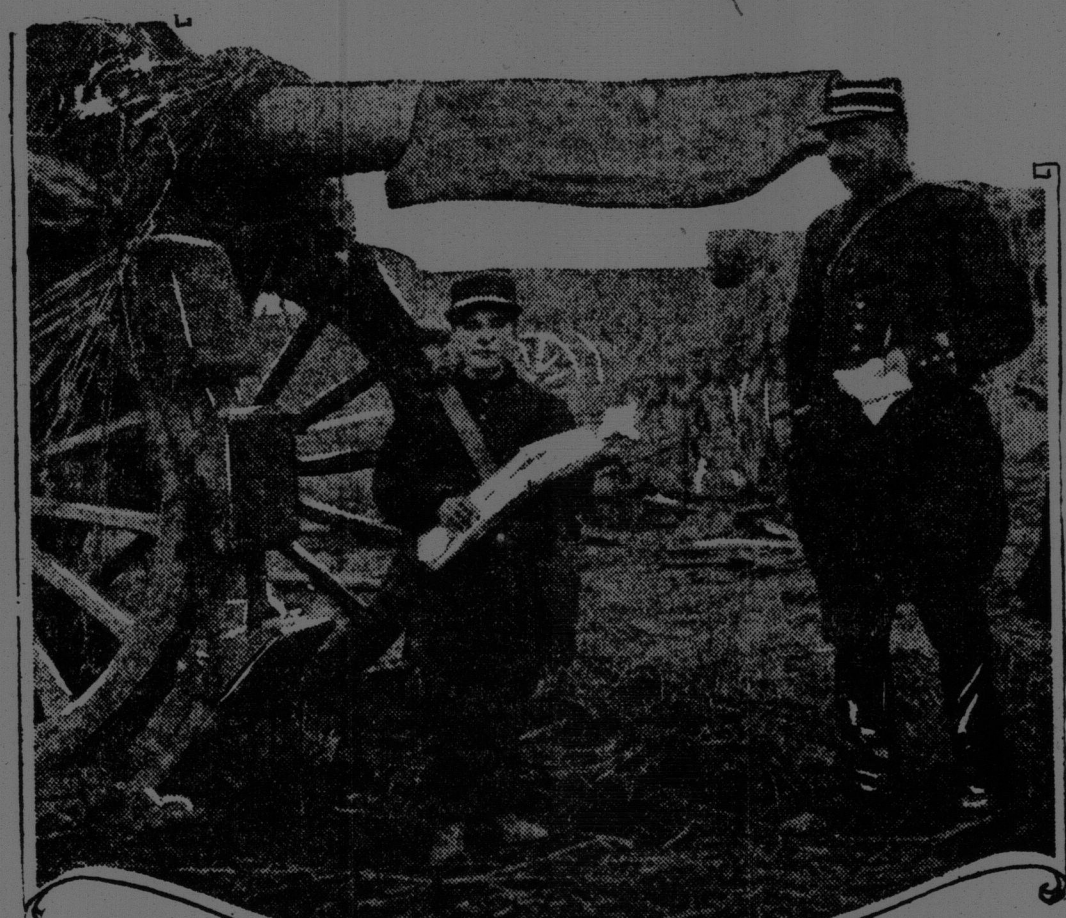

Success of Allies' Arms

Danger of Second Invasion of Egypt Removed—
Giant Warships Have Battered Down Forts
at Entrance to Dardanelles

London, March 1, 2.50 a.m.—"It is officially announced," says
the Morning Post Cairo correspondent, "that the British have oc-
cupied the Sinai peninsula. This confirms the belief here that all
danger of a second invasion of Egypt is now removed."

London, Feb. 28, 10.55 p.m.—The Russian offensive operations
appear at the present time to extend along their whole front—an
indication that they have been able to bring very strong reinforce-
ments into the field. They have successfully checked the German
advance in North Poland, where the Germans are reported to be in
retreat, and the recapture of Przemyśl after heavy fighting, has
given them an excellent point from which to carry on further op-
erations.

London, March 1—After completing the destruction of the outposts at
the entrance to the Dardanelles, the allied fleets of British and French war-
ships, the greatest fleet ever seen in action, are now attacking the inner forts
which have stood between Turkey and an attack by sea. At the head of the
fleet is the British super-dreadnought Queen Elizabeth with eight fifteen inch
guns. Others are the British battleships Irresistible, Vanguard, Cornwallis,
Albion, Triumph, Majestic and Agamemnon and the French battleships Gau-
lois, Suffren and Charlemagne. Three men were killed on the Agamemnon by a
Turkish shell.

DACA ARRESTED.

London, March 1—The steamer Dacia which was purchased by an Ameri-
can German from her German owners after the outbreak of war was arrested
yesterday in the English channel by a French cruiser and taken to Brest. She
will be turned over to the government.

SPEECH BY LLOYD GEORGE

London, March 1—David Lloyd George, chancellor of the exchequer, in an
address on Saturday, said that the need of the government for armament was
greater even than the need for men and that the government would not per-
mit industrial disputes or drinking on the part of the workmen to interfere
with the needs of the nation in a time of peril.

London, Feb. 28—Great Britain, France and their Allies have advised neu-
tral countries that they hold themselves at liberty to stop all shipping to and
from Germany and the countries of her Allies. Public announcement of this
action will be made early this week, probably Monday. The text of the de-
claration will set forth that this decision is necessary because of German sub-
marine attacks, but that Great Britain and France will respect the lives of
crews and passengers in any steps they may take.

DR. J. D. PHINNEY DEAD

Fredericton, N. B., Feb. 28—J. D.
Phinney, K. C., LL. D., passed away in
this city this afternoon in the seventy-
first year of his age. The funeral will
take place Tuesday afternoon, leaving his
late residence, University avenue, at 3
o'clock. Interment will be made at the
Rural cemetery. The deceased is sur-
vived by one son, Dr. F. D. Phinney, of
Cincinnati, one daughter, Annie,
wife of Robert W. McEllan, of this city.
One brother, Havelock Phinney, of Win-
nipeg, survives, also three sisters, Mrs.
J. D. McMin, Miss Bessie Phinney, of
Richibucto, and Mrs. Fred. Brown, of
Aspen, California.

Dr. Phinney was born in Richibucto
in 1844. He graduated from U. N. B.
and won the Douglas gold medal for
his thesis, afterwards president of the
alumni, a member of the senate and re-
ceived his degree of LL. D. from that
university. He was called to the bar
in 1869 and became a Q. C. in 1891. He
was clerk of the county court and after
probate judge for Kent county, was ac-
tive in the construction of the Kent
Northern Railway and represented Kent
in the legislature from 1887 to 1895. In
1892 he removed to Fredericton and has
been one of the most prominent mem-
bers of the bar there. In politics he was
a Liberal and in religion a Methodist.

PUBLIC NOTICE is hereby given
that a bill will be presented for enac-
tment at the next session of the Legisla-
ture intituled "An Act in further amend-
ment of 'The Saint John City Assess-
ment Act 1909 and to amend the laws
relating to civic franchise.'"
The object of the bill is—

1. to exempt all incomes from personal
labor and occupation up to and in-
cluding \$1000 per annum; also to ex-
empt \$200 of each such income above
\$1000, and not exceeding \$2000.
2. to impose a poll tax of \$2.00 and
no more upon all persons whose incomes
are totally exempt from taxation.
3. to exempt all household furniture
from taxation where the value does
not exceed \$500.
4. to provide that the last day in
which the Common Council shall have
power to determine and direct what
assessments shall be levied in the City
of Saint John shall be the 30th instead
of the 15th day of January in each year.
5. to provide that the poll tax of \$2.00
shall give the same right to vote at civic
elections which the \$5.00 poll tax now
does.
