

MANAGEMENT OF C. N. CRITICIZED

N. S. Member Reads Contract With White Star Line Favoring Portland

Provides Movement of as Much Traffic as Possible via U. S. Port

OTTAWA, March 2.—H. B. Short, Digby-Annapolis, in his speech in the commons yesterday, criticized the management of the Canadian National Railways. "They favor Portland and other American ports," he said. But that sort of thing would have to cease. The people of the Maritime were demanding that they get their share of Canadian business. Canadian ports were good enough to use during the war they should be good enough to use in peace.

Mr. Short read from a publication which stated that the Canadian National Railways had a contract with the White Star Line to move as much traffic as possible to Portland, Maine. Mr. Short urged that this contract should be cancelled. It was not in the interests of Canada or of the Maritime Provinces.

L. D. MacDougall, a Conservative of Inverness, N. S., predicted that American anthracite would in ten years be selling in Canada at from \$25 to \$30 a ton, unless other sources of supply were developed.

Mr. MacDougall urged higher tariff on bituminous and anthracite. He also pressed for recognition of the Maritime case.

CREDITS FOR FISHERMEN

H. B. Short, of Digby-Annapolis, suggested that rural credits should be extended to fishermen—the farmers of the sea.

J. L. Chabot, of Ottawa, spoke of Premier King's reference to completion of the Hudson's Bay Railway as a "brasserie" to the doctors of the West.

J. R. O'Neill, of North Tantramar, thought the railway was "another Scribe Hotel."

Adjournment of the debate was moved by Hon. Ernest Lapointe, Acting Government Leader, at 10:35 p.m.

DENTISTS HEAR ADDRESS

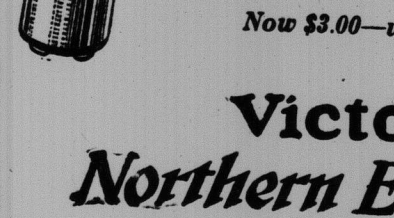

CITY LEVY GREATER

Calls For \$77,007 More Than Last Year—Now Question of Tax Rate

The total levy for the city of Saint John for 1935 has been made up by the Board of Assessors and calls for \$77,007.18 more than did the levy for 1934. Should the valuations be the same as last year this will mean a tax rate of about 10 cents on the \$100 higher than last year, when the rate was \$3.10 on each \$100 of valuation.

For 1935 the total levy is \$1,838,112, made up of \$1,404,041 for the city and \$434,071 for the county. In 1934 the total levy was \$1,761,705.87, made up of \$1,229,705.87 for the city and \$531,999.99 for the county.

SKULL FOR HOSPITAL

LONDON, March 2.—A man who lived 82 years after undergoing the exceedingly difficult and dangerous operation of trephining—making an opening in the skull for the relief of the brain—bequeathed his body to the pathological department of Guy's Hospital in his will.

The will, which disposes of property valued at \$160,000, states: "Possibly my skull and brain may be of interest to the museum."

WANT TRAGIC OPEN TO PUBLIC

Local Fish and Game Protective Association Passes Resolution

Committee Will Wait on Premier—Request Re-Appointment of Game Warden

RESOLUTIONS opposing the granting of an exclusive lease of the big Tracadie River and urging the re-appointment of Mr. Brophy as game warden in Albert county were passed at the meeting of the Saint John branch of the New Brunswick Fish and Game Protective Association, held last night in the society's rooms in Princess street with D. King Hase, president, in the chair. With reference to the protest against the lease of the big Tracadie River the meeting was informed long distance telephone message that a similar resolution had been adopted by a meeting in Tracadie that night, and that a protest was also being voiced by the residents of Loggieville. The Saint John branch decided to appoint a committee to wait upon the Premier and interview him on this matter.

It is understood that the residents of Loggieville had written to the Minister of Lands and Mines to point out that the Tracadie River would be a more valuable asset to the province if it was open to the public and could be used by tourists.

The resolution urging the re-appointment of game warden Brophy in Albert county was passed after the meeting had been informed that there was much illegal moose killing in that country recently. It was considered that Mr. Brophy had been one of the best wardens of the district and should be re-employed. Chief Game Warden L. A. Gagnon was informed of reports which had been received concerning the killing of moose, and Mr. Gagnon promised immediate action.

Allan G. McAvity, president of the New Brunswick Association was present and gave a report of what had transpired at the recent meeting of the executive in Fredericton.

It was announced that the Passamaquoddy branch of the association would be meeting tonight and would be addressed by Mr. McAvity, Inspector of the Fisheries department, and Chief Gagnon.
