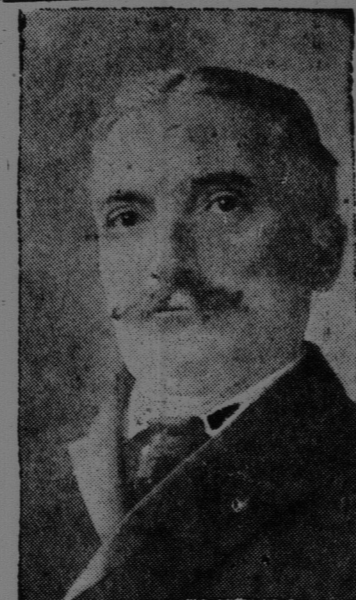

IN FAIRVILLE CHURCHES. Rev. Dr. Hubbard of Rothesay conducted services in the Church of the Good Shepherd, Fairville, yesterday. In the morning he gave a helpful sermon from Heb. 10:25, "Not forsaking the assembling of ourselves together, as the manner of some is." IS HERE FROM U.S. SEEKING HIS SON

David Esau Says it is Five Years Since He Saw the Boy.

A caller at the Times-Star office today was David Esau of Port Huron, Michigan, who said he was visiting New Brunswick and Nova Scotia in search of his son, Roy, whom he had not seen for five years. The boy, he said, was born in Londonderry, N. S., and left with his mother. The father heard of him two years ago but had not seen him since 1919. The boy would now be 17 years old. Search of Nova Scotia places failed to locate the lad. It was reported that the boy was working in a brush factory in St. John and Mr. Esau came here to make inquiries but they resulted in nothing. There was another report that he was working in the vicinity of the airport and he was being looked into. Mr. Esau planned on leaving this afternoon for Montreal on his way home. He asked that if this meets his son's eye, he write to his father care of general delivery, Port Huron. The father said he wanted to make financial provision for the son.

Ernest Cannon Sought. Mayor Potts this morning received a letter from George Cannon, Anisk, Alberta, asking if he could furnish any information about his brother, Ernest Cannon, who was last heard of in St. John. The letter stated that the missing man had enlisted here and after the war had returned to this city but from that time trace of him had been lost.
